"It is clearer than anything else to those who looked into it with consideration that these men and women, especially, had a profound consciousness that they were engaged in a vastly greater task than establishing a colony. They felt in the depths of their being that they were laying the foundation of an empire—a mighty nation."

"The underlying and the lasting causes which made this the Pilgrims a decisive event in history seem to me to be not what they did with their ships and farms, their trade and their fisheries, but with their minds and with their thoughts. It matters not whether we agree with their theology or with their forms of Christian worship. That which counted then and has counted ever since was that they set the spiritual above the material."
