PERSHING MEETS BAKER IN PARIS Secretary of War to Inspect American Armies and Confer With Officials.

Paris, March 11.—Newton D. Baker, the American secretary of war, arrived in Paris this morning. He was received by Gen. Pershing, Gen. Tasker H. Bliss, the American chief of staff; French officers representing Premier Clemenceau, and Ambassador Sharp. The secretary's voyage was without incident.

Washington, March 11.—Secretary Baker has arrived in France for an inspection of the American armies and a conference with military officials. The news of Mr. Baker's safe landing at a French port, conveyed in an Associated Press dispatch last night, brought a formal announcement from the war department emphasizing that the secretary's visit was purely military and not diplomatic.

Secretary Baker has not determined the length of time he will remain in France, said the announcement, "but his stay will be long enough to enable him to make a thorough inspection of the American forces abroad, and hold important conferences with American military officers."

Enemy Has Not Given Plans for Offensive Washington, March 11.—Nothing has developed to indicate that the Germans have abandoned their plans for a great offensive in the west since the war department's review of the military situation published today. Meanwhile, the allies, the statement continues, have taken an alert defensive and are content to let the enemy break himself against their impregnable line.

BATTLING IN FINLAND White and Red Guards Fighting Bitterly.

Stockholm, March 10.—Heavy fighting is going on in Finland between the Finnish white guard and the Russian red guard troops, according to an official statement issued on Saturday from the headquarters of the white guard at Vasa.

BAKER REACHES FRANCE; ON MILITARY MISSION

(Associated Press Review.) Secretary of War Baker, the first American cabinet officer to visit Europe in an official capacity since the United States entered the war, is now in France for conferences with Gen. Pershing and an inspection of the American troops and the position they occupy on the front between Soissons and Alsace. The secretary's mission is purely military and has no diplomatic significance.

On board an American cruiser, Secretary Baker and his party eluded German submarines and arrived yesterday at a French seaport, whence he departed for Paris. After a few days in the French capital, where he probably will meet President Poincare and Premier Clemenceau, the secretary will visit the American troops in the field.

Increased activity, especially in the artillery, on the western front has not yet resulted in any determined attack by either of the opposing forces. The Germans are more active on the British and Belgian fronts than elsewhere.

BRITISH AEROS MAKE RAID OVER BELGIUM Fires Started From Bombs Dropped on Enemy Ammunition Dump.

London, March 11.—British aviators of the naval air service yesterday made a raid over Belgium, dropping bombs on the airfield and ammunition dump at Engel, the admiralty announces. Two fires were started. In aerial combats three enemy airplanes were destroyed and four others driven down out of control. All the British planes returned safely.

GIVES RIGHT TO ACQUIRE DOCKS Washington, March 11.—The senate tentatively accepted today without a record vote an amendment to the urgent deficiency bill authorizing the president to acquire title to the docks and piers owned by the North German Lloyd company and the Hamburg-American company in Hoboken, N. J.

German Icebreaker Strikes Mine; Sinks Copenhagen, March 11.—The Hindenburg, a large German icebreaker, struck a mine south of the Aland Islands Saturday and sank, according to the Dagbladet Nyheter. Several members of the crew were drowned.

CONVICTION OF HAMBURG LINE MEN SUSTAINED Washington, March 11.—Conviction of Karl Bunz, managing director and two other officials of the Hamburg-American line for violating the shipping laws by sending supplies to German cruisers from American ports was in effect sustained today by the supreme court which refused to review the proceedings.

FORMER METHODIST PREACHER SENTENCED St. Louis, March 11.—Eugene J. Dean, of Mexico, Mo., today was sentenced in the federal court to imprisonment in the penitentiary at Leavenworth for a year for violation of the espionage act. He was found guilty of having offered to put a drug in the eyes of William G. Johnson, so that Johnson would be rejected in the army draft. Dean formerly was a Methodist pastor.

OVER FIVE OF MEXICAN BANDIT BAND KILLED Laredo, Tex., March 11.—Between five and ten of the Mexican bandits who raided East ranch Thursday night were killed by Capt. Ryan's company of rangers, according to Sgt. Willis, who was one of the posse in pursuit of the band.

ENTERS PLEA OF NOT GUILTY OF WIFE MURDER Raleigh, N. C., March 11.—Marcus Edwards, charged with the murder of his wife, pleaded not guilty when his case was called in Wake county superior court here today. The entire morning was consumed in the selection of a jury, which was completed shortly before recess. The taking of testimony began at the afternoon session.
