SUPERIOR KIDNEY REMEDY LUXBURG MAKES **ESCAPE TO CHILE**

Former German Minister Reported to Have Fled From Argentina.

Buenos Aires, March 12.-It is reported here today that Count Von Luxburg, the former German minister, has fled Argentine territory, escaping to

Count von Luxburg's escape was suspected when reports came from Poente Del Inca, in the Andes, that the former minister, the former German naval attache and a large group of other Germans passed there last night on the international train for Chile.

Missing for Several Days.

Inquiry of the police here showed that Count von Luxburg had been missing for several days from the house in the suburb of Lomas de Zamora, where he was supposed to have been under strict surveillance. The count was permitted to live there because the German hospital authorities had informed the government that his mental condition required quiet sur-

The former minister is believed to have decided to escape when he saw the government was renewing its efforts to get him out of the country These efforts were initiated two weeks ago and had resulted in the granting of safe conduct for him to sail on a Swedish vessel about to leave port. Count von Luxburg's escape on the eve of his enforced departure strengthens the long standing belief here that he was making every effort to remain in South America to direct the activi-ties of German agents who have been fomenting labor troubles and harassing allied shipping.

According to Buenos Aires dis-patches on Sunday, Count Von Luxburg had been granted a safe conduct by the British government to sail for Sweden and was expected to depart shortly on the steamer Valparaiso.

USE PRISONERS ON FARM LANDS

Montgomery, March 12.-An appeal was wired to President Wilson Mon-day by Gov. Charles Henderson to have German prisoners of war placed on the farms and on public works throughout the south and relieve the shortage of labor, which has reached such a crisis. The governor says in his telegram that "considerable acreage of farm lands cannot be cultivated for lack of labor, which has abandoned the farm for the liberal wages paid at

these public works."
Farm labor, the telegram says, would thus be released for agriculture if they can be brought over by April 15 and advance notice given of their

WILSON STUDIES NEW CASUALTY LIST PLAN

Wilson today personally considered the war department's new plan of issuing the names of American soldiers killed, wounded or who die in France, without their home addresses or other marks

of identification. There was no outward indication that the president would reverse the war department's ruling, which, it has been explained, was made for military reasons, but it was plain that protests from every quarter have grown to such number that the president had decided to inform himself of all the facts.

The raid was highly successful as the enemy withdrew many men from the front line when the bombardment indicated that a raid might follow. The raiders reported that American gunfire had created destruction in the German positions and had torn gaps in the enemy barbed wire entanglements.. The Americans entered the enemy trenches behind one side of a "box barrage which moved forward in front of them. They found numerous Ger-mans hiding in the dugouts. Going far beyond their objective the raiders penetrated the German line 300 A few fights developed on the way, but the Germans were driven off.
The Americans failed to find most of
the Germans, who had been withdrawn hurriedly from the front line, although they searched for them.

The Americans fought so fast and medical men who accompanied them had little to do. Every American who

Washington, March 12.-Maj.-Gen. ohn Biddle, who recently was relieved by Maj.-Gen. Peyton C. March, as acting chief-of-staff, is to command all American troops in England, it is understood. Army orders today show the assignment of two officers as aides on Gen, Biddle was appointed assistant

chief-of-staff, just before Gen. Bliss made his first trip to Europe as a member of the supreme war council. He relinqueshed that post as well as his place as acting chief on the arrival of Gen. March and Brig.-Gen. Wm. Graves is now acting as assistant to Gen. March.

Under new regulations, Gen. March has five assistants, all general officers. He is understood to be considering now the selection of officers to fill these posts permanently, the department having announced that the present incumbents held office temporarily; pending the arrival and action of the

Speculation Revived. Maj.-Gen. Geo. T. Bartlett has been in command in England, where several American units, including engineers and heavy artillery, have been training at British camps. It is not known to what post Gen. Bartlett has been as-

signed.
The appointment of Gen. Biddle revived speculation as to the course the war department may take in regard to the proposal that American troops be trained completely with the British war machine as well as with the French. The plan included front line training in the trenches in Flanders, although after training was completed the forces would be sent to join Gen. Pershing's
