The letter, in part, is as follows: "Somewhere in France, Feb. 12, 1918. 'Dear Aunt Margaret: I want to thank you and Aunt Sarah for the nice sweater, helmet and wristlets, also the delicious chocolate candy you sent me. I received them today and certainly appreciate them. They will surely be of great service in this cold winter over here. There have been many times when I would have given much for those things.'

"Today another one of our boys was decorated by French officers. That makes two Croix de Guerres in our section, the other having been won by a South Carolina boy. Our army regulations will not allow the boys to wear them, but the honor is sufficient. 'I am getting along all right. I have gained really in weight, but I am still a little fat. I can stand it all right. So tell me the strain of war is not telling much on me.'

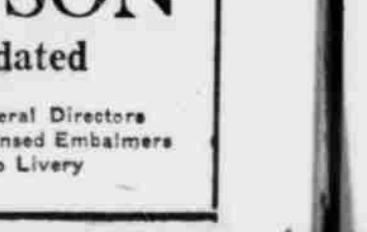
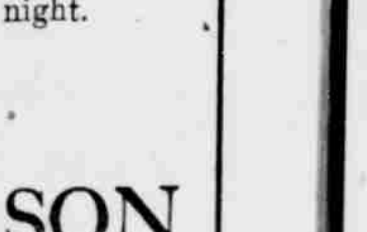
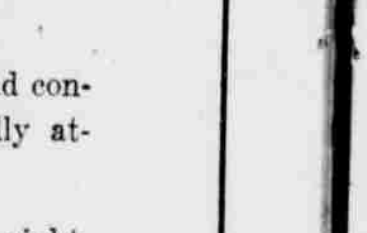
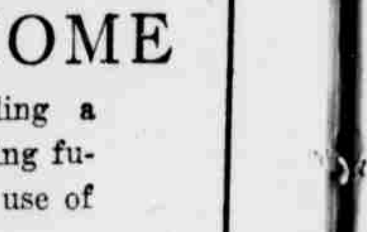
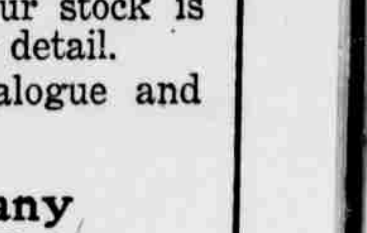
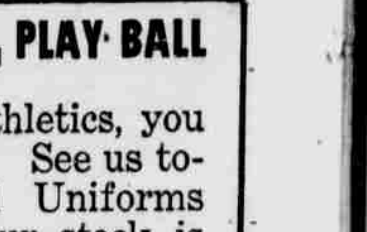
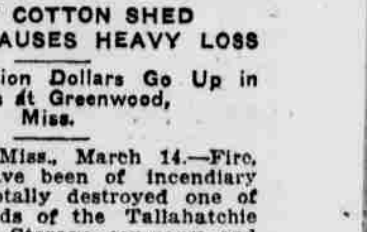
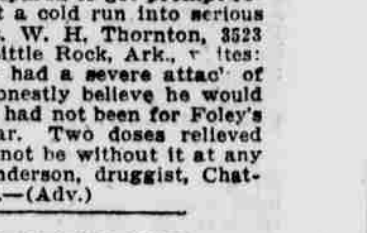
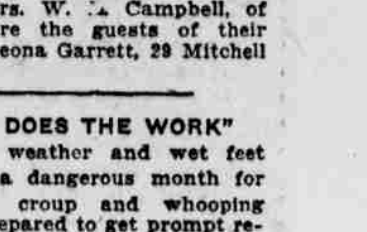
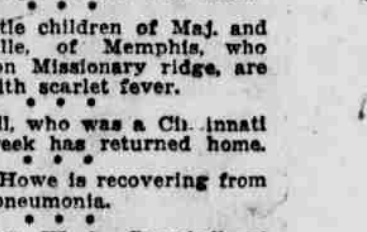
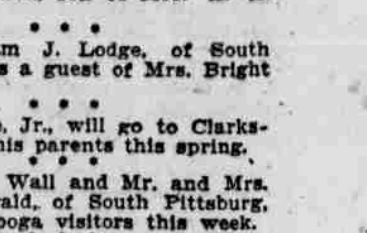
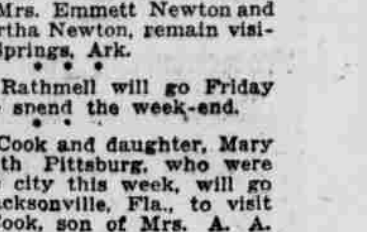
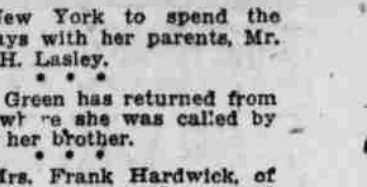
The loss is estimated from \$700,000 to \$800,000.
