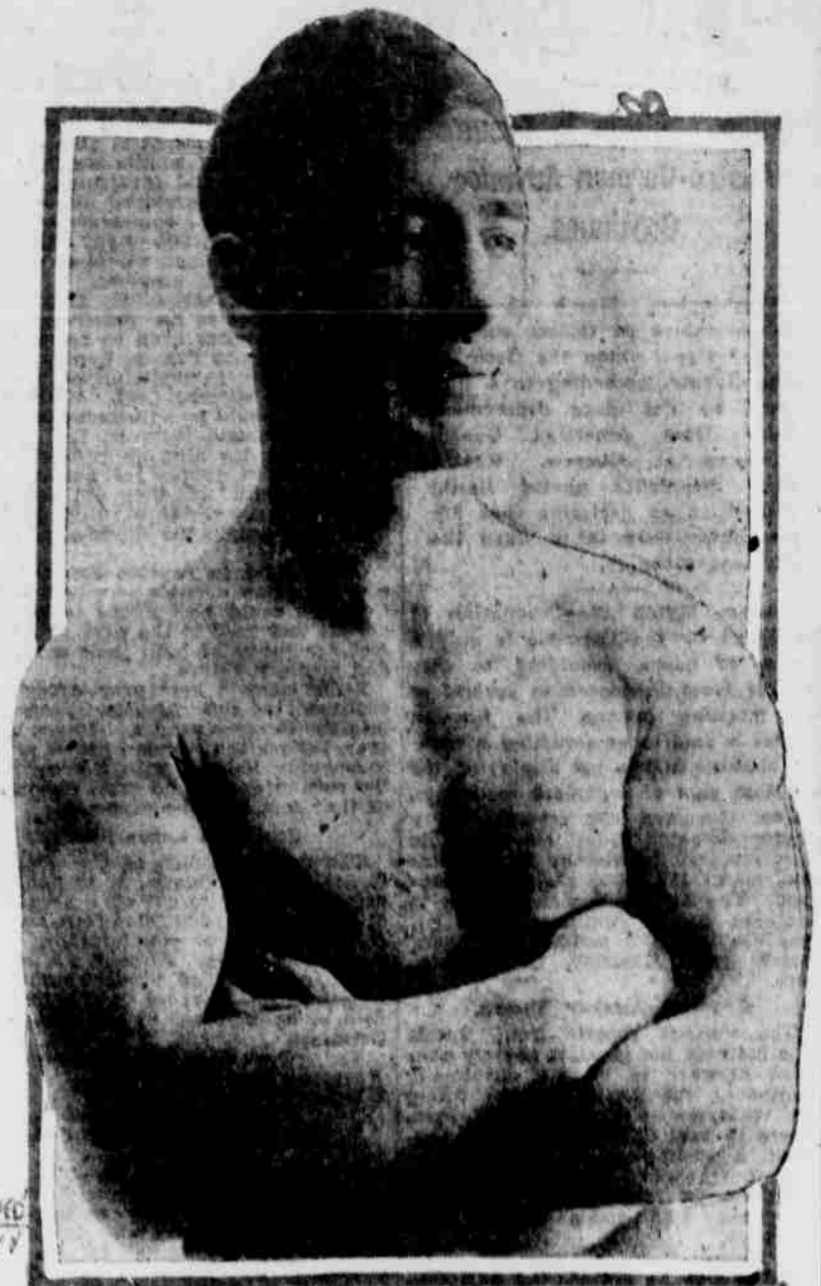

JACK BRITTON, WHO FACES VIC MORAN AT UNION ATHLETIC CLUB TONIGHT



Jack Britton, who gained the decision over Ted Lewis in Atlanta a few weeks ago and who faces Vic Moran here at the Union Athletic club tonight, is a southerner. He has a half-hook, delivered with the left hand nearly straight, which won him the welter championship in 1916. It is said to be something like the famous McCoy "corkscrew." "I snap it across and turn my hand to hit the first two knuckles," Britton explains. "It isn't pushed out like a jab; it sweeps across."

Britton is an unusually quiet and unassuming fellow for a fighter. There is no bragging, and he discusses fighting with you as though you might know a little about the game, and he has not been sent down as an apostle to enlighten you. He has been fighting six years, and during that time has met Ted Lewis fourteen times. Asked if age was beginning to pile up on his shoulders, the fighter frankly stated that possibly his speed has been slightly diminished, but that the experience has taught him many points that more than counteract the handicap. It is more than probable, too, that there is not much sketch on his speed qualities, either, judging from the fighting he has been doing recently and his last match with Lewis.

Britton has the reputation of being an absolutely clean fighter, not only clean in his ring tactics, but in business and living. He has a wife and two children back up New York way, and—but this is a secret—there is to be another little welter champion before long, or perhaps it will be a lady, but Jack's hoping not.

Britton's outstanding quality is his ability to escape punishment. He has a way of slipping out from under the heavy ones, and says himself that he has very seldom faced a severe beating. His hardest fights were against Pa'ky McFlynn and Ted Lewis, he declares, and though it was Lewis who took his welterweight crown away from him, Britton doesn't believe he earned it, and still has hopes of winning it back.

The preliminaries for tonight will be between Terry Nelson and Kid Kelly and Young Green and Frank Griffith.

POLE FOULS ED LEWIS WHEN HEAD HOLD PINCHES

Westergard Goes Down to Americus—Wrestling Festival in New York.

New York, March 20.—Wladek Zhyzsko, of Poland, was disqualified in his wrestling bout with Ed Strangler Lewis, of Lexington, Ky., at Madison Square Garden here last night. Lewis had obtained a head hold and Zhyzsko butted with his head, striking Lewis on the jaw and knocking him unconscious. The time of the bout was 37 minutes 23 seconds.

Yussif Hussain, of the Balkans, threw Mort Henderson, of Rochester, N. Y., with an arm and crotch hold in 23 minutes and 25 seconds.

American of Baltimore, threw Jess Westergard, of Iowa, with an arm and crotch hold in 25 minutes and 29 seconds.

Joe Malowitch, of Utica, N. Y., was given a referee's decision over George Manich, of Serbia, after thirty minutes of wrestling.

SUIT STARTS AGAINST ST. LOUIS MANAGER ON SLANDER CHARGE

St. Louis, Mo., March 20.—The hearing in the suit of John Lavan, formerly shortstop with the St. Louis Americans, against Phil E. Ball, president of the club, in which the latter is charged with making slanderous accusations, has been set for April 22 in the circuit court. A similar hearing, in which Derrill Pratt, second baseman, is the plaintiff, has been set for April 22.

Both players assert that Ball publicly accused them of "laying down" in their work, and ask \$50,000 damages each. The suit is against Ball personally. Depositions of twenty major league baseball players have been taken in an effort to ascertain the meaning of "laying down."

Farmers Must File Affidavits To Forestall Draft of Help

Washington, March 20.—Farmers seeking to have their help given deferred classification in the draft must file affidavits with local draft boards, the department of labor announced today. Attention was called to the fact that the boards have no authority to give deferred classification otherwise.

"If farmers whose hands are affected in this new call fail to file affidavits they should have no cause for complaint if their men are taken from them at this critical time," the statement says. "It will be useless to protest later."

Ratification of "Dry" Bill Again in Dispute

Albany, N. Y., March 20.—The proposed referendum on the ratification of the prohibition amendment to the federal constitution was revived in the legislature today when the taxation committee of the senate voted to report the Hill-McNab ratification resolution amended so as to be virtually a duplicate of the Machold amendment, consideration of which was indefinitely postponed by the assembly yesterday.

GOLDSOLL ARRAIGNED ON TECHNICAL CHARGE

Washington, March 20.—Frank J. Goldsoll, accused by the French embassy of proffering to the extent of several millions on French war contracts in America, was arraigned here today for extradition purposes on a technical charge of larceny of \$200 in France.
