LIQUOR TRAFFIC HAS BACK TO WALL, DECLARES GOV. HANLY, OF INDIANA

Speaker at Baptist Church Tells of Good Work Done in Florida and Says Ratification of Prohibition Amendment Irrepressible.

"Its days are numbered," declared Gov. J. P. Hanly, of Indiana, addressing a large audience at the Baptist church Thursday evening and referring to the liquor traffic, which he is fighting.

"The ratification of the national amendment is the culmination of the irrevocable proposition," he emphasized. He pointed out that nine states have ratified it already; four of these, he mentioned, are wet states—Kentucky, Maryland, Texas and Delaware.

DESCRIBES SERVICES IN FRENCH CHURCH

First Lieut. Ben F. Ingram, a well-known young Chattanooga, who is "somewhere in France," gives an interesting account, in a letter to his sister, Miss Addie Ingram, of his visit to a church.

He described the church as being a very beautiful building, with everything except the floor being white marble. The floor, he explained, was like the paving on Market street—wood blocks.

In a letter to Miss Anna Ingram, the young officer said he was walking down a street in the first French town that he was in, when he heard a sudden clattering that sounded like a troop of cavalry coming down the street behind him.

French Officers to Aid in Liberty Loan Drive

The French and English officers stationed as instructors at Fort Oglethorpe have received their first assignment. In connection with arousing enthusiasm and patriotism in the third liberty loan.

Plans were made Friday for taking them to Lynchburg, Tenn., Saturday, March 30, for a patriotic rally planned for that day by Thomas Motlow, county chairman of Moore county.

The principal address will be made by Prof. Morgan, of Fayetteville. Talks will be made by C. C. Nottingham, zone chairman; W. H. Cummings, state senator; Lewis Burke, zone secretary; and Silas W. Davis, field representative.

Mr. Motlow has a great deal of enthusiasm has already been stirred up for this meeting and that the meeting itself is bound to stimulate a much greater interest in the third liberty loan.

Gov. Hanly will start a campaign of the various military cantonnements in America within the next two months. It will not be in behalf of the national prohibition, but as a part of the general entertainment furnished by the Y. M. C. A.
