### AGITATE SLOGAN OF TEMPERANCE

#### New Victories Won in an Old Way—Public Must Be Aroused.

(By William T. Ellis.)

"Agitate! Agitate! Agitate!" This has ever been a watchword of temperance workers. We must keep the saloon issue alive. With unremitting zeal we are to arouse the public to an appreciation of the evil of liquor selling. Only thus can a general sentiment be created against the vice business. Then, when the happy day comes wherein the majority opinion is opposed to the saloon, we shall see the end of this blight on our Christian civilization.

We ought to have pronounced sentiments on the saloon issue because the saloon is a pronounced evil. Half-hearted sentiment is not enough. We should feel strongly against the sin of liquor selling and our feelings should be known. The saloon would not have so easy a time if it were known that the best people of the community were its outspoken enemies.

Every mouth closed against strong drink helps close the saloon. Personal abstinence is the first step toward a solution of the liquor problem.

When the liquor dealers, big and little, are made to feel disreputable—more disreputable, even than the drunkard—one long step will have been taken toward the overthrow of the saloon.

Patriotism as well as religion should impel us to oppose the saloon, for it is the great debaucher of politics and legislation. Next to corporate greed, and akin to it, the saloon is, perhaps, the greatest existing menace to our national welfare. As we love the purity of our nation, and as we cherish its sacred ideals, we should contend against this power which threatens us.

The truly self-mastered life is the Christ-mastered life. That is the story, written in letters of gold in the annals of the rescue missions and the churches. "When the Keeley cure first tried the Calvary cure," said a mission worker to a crowd of down-and-outs. That advice has been tested and found good. In the McAuley mission, down in Water street, New York, many have found some wealth whom money could not save, college men, whom education could not save, once successful men whom strong wills could not save, but who joyfully confess that they have been redeemed by the power of the Lord Jesus Christ.

### STATEWIDE PROHIBITION RESOLUTION ADOPTED

#### Parliamentary Wrangle Follows Report on Statutory Exempting Wines and Alcoholic Liquors.

Albany, N. Y., March 22.—Prohibition continued as the principal issue before the senate. By a vote of 27 to 22, the taxation committee's resolution for statewide prohibition by constitutional amendment was adopted after a brief debate. In addition, the taxation committee reported an amended form of a measure introduced earlier in the session designed to provide for statutory prohibition except in the case of light wines and malt liquors containing less than 3 per cent. of alcohol.

The submission of the taxation committee's report on statutory prohibition, with wines and malt liquors exempted, caused a parliamentary wrangle, and eventually it was assigned to the general orders calendar.

### ACTIVITY OF AERIAL FORCE ON MACEDONIAN FRONT

#### Allied Planes Drop Bombs on Stations at Angiata and Porna—Hostile Machines Shot Down.

London, Wednesday, March 28.—There has been great activity by the aerial forces operating on the Macedonian front, according to an official report from the general staff. "Our airplanes dropped bombs on the stations at Angiata and Porna. Near the latter place a train was attacked by machine gun fire from a low altitude. The engine driver was seen to jump off and the train was derailed. Subsequently it was bombed."

"Another airplane directed machine gun fire from an altitude of 20,000 feet against a Bulgarian company billeted in Perna. A hostile machine which was shot down fell into Lake Doiran."
