### Crowell, Texas

Having quite a few friends in your vicinity who have asked that I give them a description of this country I take this method of telling them what I know of Texas and Foard County.

Foard County is the producer of wheat, cotton, corn, oats, milo-maize and kaffir corn, some alfalfa, sorghum, and as fine watermelons as grow anywhere. The wheat crop will this year run from eight to twenty-five bushels per acre, and prospect were never better for cotton and since the recent rains over the county in the last week the farmers are estimating from one-third to one bale per acre, and buyers here are estimating the number of bales to be shipped from this place for the coming season at twelve thousand bales.

Corn and oats did no good here this year on account the dry weather that we had just at the time these two products should have made. Last year some corn made forty bushels per acre and oats made from twenty-five to fifty bushels and one or two farms made as high as ninety bushels of oats per acre.

Milo Maize and Kaffir are the products that take the place of corn in way of feed stuff and are a never failing crop, and the average is thirty to ninety bushels per acre.

There are quite a number of schools through the country and every community boasts a good school, there being nineteen different school houses in the county some of these having as high as four teachers, this does not include the Crowell Independent School, there being nine teachers in this school.

I would advise anyone interested to come and take a look at this country and you can then get your own ideas of what this country is. **SID VERBLE.**
