PRIMARY ELECTION RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. Primary Election is hereby ordered to be held at each voting precinct in Hancock County Tenn., on Saturday December the 10th, 1921, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various offices of the county, to be voted for in the one general Election to be held in August 1922.

2. Said Primary Election shall be opened at 9 o'clock A. M. and closed at four o'clock P. M.

3. If any officer of the primary fails to serve, the remaining officers willing to serve shall fill the vacancy on the morning of the Election.

4. All the Republicans recognized as such in the precinct where the votes are to be cast, shall be permitted to vote in said Election, but no other. No person will not be allowed to vote if challenged, will not pledge himself to vote for and support the successful candidates, and all persons voting there in shall be deemed to have pledged their vote for the nominee, and all voters must vote in his precinct.

5. All young republicans who will be of age and qualified to vote at the August Election in 1922, shall be qualified to vote in said Election and in case the officers should be in doubt about as to the right of any person to vote, such person shall be sworn and examined as to his right to vote and bystanders shall challenge the right of the person to vote.

6. The Election board shall furnish the officers in this Election with pole books and a copy of the rules and regulations. The ballots shall be properly counted the same as in General Election. The returns shall be properly signed and certified and the officer of the Election shall seal and address the pole books and shall mail one to A. F. Mitchell Chairman, Sneedville, Tennessee, or deliver them in person. The tickets voted and counted shall likewise be sealed and delivered to the Chairman of this Board.

7. The Election Board shall meet at the court house in Sneedville on December, 17, 1921 at 12 p. m. and in the presence of any person or persons open and count the returns and the Secretary shall of other members of the Board and those present, make out a tabulative statement of the result, which shall be signed by the board and if any member of the board shall not concur with the majority of the board he shall sign in writing his reason there of.

8. Any unsuccessful candidate may contest the nomination of the successful candidate before the said election board and notice thereof must be given in writing to the Chairman of the committee and the candidate whose nomination is contested, not later than December the 17th, at 12 o'clock and set out his grounds for contest therein. The committee shall determine the same as soon as possible and their decision shall be final.

9. Any one desiring to be a candidate for any of these offices herein mentioned shall on or before the 26th day of November 1921 notify the Chairman or Secretary of their intentions and shall deposit with the Chairman or Secretary the sum of \$10.00 to help defray the expenses of said election and shall also state that he will comply with the rules and regulations of said Primary Election and that he approves and agrees to the following pledge.

We, the undersigned candidates for Trustee, Sheriff, County Court Clerk, Circuit Court Clerk and Register in Republican Primary to be held for Hancock County on December the 10th 1921, do solemnly pledge our Honor that we will not directly or indirectly use, or cause to be spent any money, or things of value, or pay back any said money or demands made upon us for such money or value that may have been spent, or used in said Primary for buying or influencing votes and that we have not spent, or placed any money in the hands of any one to be spent for us and we will not be guilty of such acts; and we earnestly request and insist that the Executive Committee absolutely refuse to declare any candidate or candidates the nominee of said party, in said Primary, who indulges in the habit of influencing votes by the use of any undue influence.

10th. The expense of printing the polebooks, advertising the election and other necessary and legitimate expenses of same shall be borne equally by the candidates qualifying.

11th. Any candidate who fails to comply with the requirements of these

Rules and Regulations on or by the 26, day of November 1921, forfeits the privilege of having his name printed on the ticket.

12th. Any candidate whose election is procured through the influence of money whether used by himself, his friends, or any person whomsoever in his behalf, shall not be declared the nominee by this Committee, and this fact shall be determined by sworn testimony of witnesses to be heard by this committee.

13th. No pole tax receipt shall be required as a qualification to vote. Each candidate shall have the privilege of representation at and during the voting and counting the ballots and sealing the returns.

14th. After the expiration of the time to qualify fixed and set apart in these rules and regulations, should not more than one candidate qualify for any of these respective offices, the Chairman of the Executive Committee shall immediately notify the other members of the Committee, who shall meet and declare him the nominee of the Republican party to be voted for in the August Election, 1922.
