### THE GOLD PANIC.

The Excitement is Still Very Great in Wall Street.

The Bank of New York Undertakes Friday's Clearances.

The Excitement is Transferred to the Stock Exchange.

Small Fry Swept Out of Existence and Large Ones Weakened.

Confusion Worse Confounded—Things Very Much Mixed.

New York, September 28.—The excitement in Wall street was very great throughout the day, and the general feeling was one of uncertainty. The Committee from the Gold Room, appointed in the morning, soon reported that the Bank of New York would undertake the clearances of last Friday's gold room, subject to the following conditions: That every statement must be correct, and that if there is a gold balance, it must be paid in gold, and if in currency, that it must be paid in certified checks.

The bank agreed that all transactions at the bank should be made on a basis of \$100 for gold, and that all differences should be settled between the respective dealers outside of the bank, and then voted to remain open only for transactions in the gold market, and that it was agreed that all loans be made to-day free of interest.

At 3 p.m. the committee reported that the Bank of New York found its clerical force insufficient to clear Friday's contracts in the Gold room, and that it was necessary to request the market to suspend its regular operations. In this emergency a resolution that a committee of twenty members be appointed to receive all the clearing house sheets and examine them carefully, without receiving any money or balance, and finding all correct, strike a balance sheet of the whole and present it to the Bank of New York was adopted after a strong debate.

The committee thus appointed, in its report, work all night, and on Monday morning, work all night. Loss, \$20,000. Over twenty people were rescued from death by brave firemen.

CINCINNATI, September 28.—Herring, the famous running horse, died this morning of lung fever. His owner refused \$45,000 for him within the hour.

ALEXANDRIA, Va., September 28.—Mr. Johnson, Conservative, was re-elected to the Legislature yesterday. In July this county went Radical by 125 majority.

HAVERHILL, Mass., September 28.—The liabilities of Clark Hall, of Rockville, a large manufacturer, and President and Treasurer of the Tailors Insurance Company, amounts to a quarter of a million.

NEW YORK, September 28.—The National Military Asylum was dedicated yesterday. It has a front of 240 feet, and will accommodate 600 inmates. Butler delivered the address.

## WASHINGTON.

### Peruvian Affairs—New Minister for China.

WASHINGTON, September 28.—The report that Col. Freyre, the Peruvian Minister, had had his attention called to the fact that he is taking too much interest in the affairs of the Cuban insurgents, etc., is without foundation in truth. The best understanding exists between our Government and the Peruvian legation. The course of Minister Freyre in relation to the Cuban affairs is in accordance with the action of Peru in recognizing the independence of Cuba, and for such he is of course responsible only to his Government, and if Mr. Fish had occasion to address any body on the subject, it would have been to the Peruvian Government itself.

Frederick F. Law, of California, has been appointed Minister Plenipotentiary and Ex-Officio Extraordinary to China. At noon the Cabinet met, but the only members present were Secretary, Cox and Hoar, Assistant Secretary of State Davis, and Assistant Postmaster General Egan, represented the heads of their Departments.

## EASTERN HEMISPHERE.

FROM FRANCE.

Paris, September 28.—It is said that Father Hyacinthe will be defended in the Court by the Bishops of Aragon, Rheims, Chalons and Bayeux.

FROM PORTUGAL.

Lisbon, September 28.—The King of Portugal published a decree, the substance of which is that he is a candidate for the throne of Spain. He says he was born a native of Portugal and will die a native.

FROM SPAIN.

Madrid, September 28.—The troubles at Barcelona have been quieted, and the city is tranquil. One hundred and twenty-six persons have been arrested for complicity, and many escaped. The fugitives destroyed the telegraph wires and railroad tracks to prevent capture. Troops have been sent in pursuit, and to protect the laborers engaged in repairing the railroad and telegraph.

Reinforcements for the Spanish army in Cuba sailed from Cadix to-day.
