SPECIAL TO THE APPEAL.

NASHVILLE, December 2.—Mr. Robbins presented a memorial from the Memphis Board of Trade.

Mr. Palmer's resolution to adjourn from 21st of December to 1st of March was laid over.

House bill prohibiting the carrying of concealed weapons was amended so as to prohibit the selling or giving away of liquors to minors.

The House bill to incorporate the Haywood Mechanical, Agricultural and Horticultural Association passed a third reading.

The Senate bills to repeal the common school laws and limit the fees of Sheriffs in criminal cases, and to incorporate the Brownsville Manufacturing Company, passed a third reading.

The Senate bill to reduce the tax on merchants' privileges, polls, etc., was taken up and referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Ways and Means Committee reported a bill in lieu of that for January, 1870, the rate of taxation on real estate and personal property, exclusive of the tax on common schools, be twenty cents on the hundred dollars, and that no property be exempt from taxation.

After a lengthy discussion, the Senate adjourned without action.

House.—Mr. Hornerberger offered a motion to reconsider the vote postponing the consideration of the bill modifying the usury laws, to the first Monday in February.

A bill was introduced instructing the Comptroller and Tax-Collector to receive the notes of the Bank of Tennessee in payment of taxes and other dues to the State.

Mr. Singletary introduced a bill empowering the Courts to grant corporate privileges.

Mr. Caldwell introduced a bill incorporating the Gardner Female Academy of Weakly county.

Mr. Enloe offered a resolution requesting colored people not to drink from water-coolers belonging to the House.

The House bill to repeal the law organizing the Governor's staff, was amended so as to allow the Governor to appoint a Private Secretary, at a salary of \$1200, and passed third reading.

The House bill to elect a State Reporter was passed.

The Senate bill repealing the act giving compensation to local citizens for injury sustained during the war, passed third reading.

The Senate bill directing Samuel Watson, Trustee, to dismiss the suit against paid debts due the "Bank of Tennessee," was passed.

The House bill prohibiting the sale of spirituous liquors on Sunday, was laid on the table.

ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCH.

NASHVILLE, December 2.—The Senate reconsidered the final vote on the bill reducing the State tax fifty per cent, and laid on the table.

The Senate now engaged on the bill to reduce the tax twenty per cent, which will probably pass.

CANADA.

Confederation Discussion in the Provincial Parliament.

Toronto, November 2.—In the Legislature, last night, Mr. Hie followed the usual course of the discussion, as a necessary consequence, an address to the Crown, praying that the right of the Imperial Legislature, be not be rendered impossible for the Province of Canada to disturb the Union of the British Empire.

Mr. Blake supported the resolution in a speech of considerable length, and in a very animated character took place.

Mr. Clark moved an amendment, declaring the proposed address inadvisable, and on a division the amendment was defeated, by 17 to 12.

The original motion was then carried.

The address was at once prepared, and the report thereon adopted, and the address ordered to be presented.

The Spanish Gunboats.

New York, December 2.—In the Spanish gunboat case Judge Pierson was served with copies of papers, yesterday, in which it was intended substantially to base the motion for a discharge of the boats. These papers are not yet put in form, and the belief was prevalent at the District Attorney's office that they may be changed again before hearing on Saturday, as they had been changed twice since they were originally prepared.

LITTLE ROCK, December 2.—Judge Yongley has decided one controversy affecting the original railroad company in favor of Brinkley, Owen, and Williams, of the old company, and those who had given bonds and were arrested are released.

Mr. Brinkley has filed his petition to have the pending suits about the railroad transferred to the Federal Court, and the Federal Court is asked to dispose of all the questions involved.

Mr. Brinkley had employed and provided for the transfer to Arkansas, of a thousand laborers. These will not now be shipped from New York, and work on the road is suspended indefinitely.
