"The World," to be

The raft scene is said to be one of

plot centers upon two brothers, proud

The first act is laid at the wharf at
Cape Town, Africa, a steamer in the
foreground about to start for England,

the vessel gets under way, closing the

The second act shows the calm open
sea by moonlight. Suddenly an explo-
sion, occurs the vessel careens and
goes down with the flames leaping up
her masts as she sinks.
The third act is the celebrated raft
scene, where four of the heroes saved
from the wreck are seen drifting about
and the description says "the red sun
kisses the far off horizon." This act
closes with the rescue of the quartette
after they are about to give up all hope.
The fourth act is a grand scene in
London, showing the interior of a
madhouse, and an escape therefrom by
one of the principal characters.
The fifth act introduces the great
elevator scene, with passengers as-
cending and descending in a hotel.
A fight in the elevator occurs wherein
down the shaft and the other is car-
ried off to jail, while the happy lovers
get married and all ends serene.
