

HAZING REPORTS TOLD BY SCALES

Admiral Declares Practice Not as Serious as Has Been Indicated.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 18.—Hazing is not nearly as serious at the Naval academy as it has been represented to me," Rear Admiral A. H. Scales, superintendent, told newspaper men whom he called in conference with him.

The admiral said his attitude along had been to bring about a complete extermination of the time-honored objectionable practices of hazing and that especially during the last few weeks his attention has been in that direction.

"Hazing names," said Admiral Scales, "and matters of department administration, I shall be very glad to relate the complete history of the hazing incidents. For two seasons I have been reticent in giving statements to the press. First, because I did not wish to appear to be defending myself, and second, because I did not desire to seem to attack the midshipmen."

Most of the hazing, he said, could well be called trivial offenses in themselves, but when they are practiced in a small way a large number of midshipmen, the composite hazing has an effect that the average youth can not stand.

MAYSVILLE, Ky., Nov. 18.—A number of persons were overcome and cattle in fields fell to the ground when chlorine gas began escaping from tanks in a freight car of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad here. The car was pulled out of the city to a siding where it finally was stranded, but only after a member of the train crew also was overcome by the gas.

Ministers' Salaries Boosted Million

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—A \$1,000,000 increase in salaries to ministers of the Protestant Episcopal church has been paid during the last year—an average of \$250 to each clergyman of the denomination—Monell Sayre, secretary of the church pension fund, estimated here today.

The cause of this increase is attributed largely to the nation-wide campaign in the Episcopal church begun in the spring of 1919 calling for a living wage for all clergymen. Individual dioceses and parishes have paid the increase, Mr. Sayre said.
