
Shot From Ambush

George Westerfield Killed, Prest Meeks Wounded

George Westerfield was shot and instantly killed last Sunday night at the home of Prest Meeks, where Westerfield, and several others were guading the home of Meeks who had been warned that some parties were coming after him. Meeks cap brim was also shot off and two stray shot hit him in the forehead glancing off. Westerfield and Meeks were stationed at the front of the Meeks home and the other guards stationed at the back, and the parties who done the shooting came in the front way for the shots that killed Westerfield indicated that he was shot from the front side. Meeks would have undoubtedly been killed but he ran in time to save his life.

John Ladd, Alf Ladd, and the two Wither Bros., were arrested Monday charged with the shooting and the preliminary hearing set for to-day.

The preliminary trial which was held Thursday, was tried before Esqs. W. J. Jossi, W. E. Arbuckle and Jno. P. Wright, and the defendants were held to Circuit Court and placed under a \$5000 bond. The trial consumed a whole day and some 20 witnesses were examined. Estill and Crownover of Winchester represented the State and Judge Frank L. Lynch represented the defense.

Henry Ford To Conduct Model Farm

Will Demonstrate Practical Power Farming to Farmers

Henry Ford is setting up a model farm for the inspection of visitors at the Michigan State Fair. He will endeavor to show how practically all of the work of a farm can be done by machinery. His Fordson tractors will supply the power.

The "farm" will be set up on a section of the fair grounds, where crops grown during the summer will be ready for harvesting. Model farm buildings, all lighted and heated by electricity developed by Fordson power, will be erected as a part of the complete farm equipment.

Fordson tractors will show farmers visiting the fair how ground can be prepared for planting with the least amount of human effort, time and money. Planting equipment will be shown in actual operation. A field of wheat will be harvested and threshed. The grain will be hauled to a small mill on the farm and turned into flour which in turn will be made into bread in a model bakery. Slices of fresh warm bread will be passed out to visitors. In the meantime on another section of the "farm" tractors will be busy cultivating corn and others will be cutting and gathering the crop.

"We want to make our model farm an educational exhibit to

show just what can be done on a farm with a tractor," said one of the Ford tractor experts at the Ford Plant in Dearborn where the big exhibit is being prepared.

"It is our idea to carry to the farmer the idea that a tractor is a mobile power unit which can be moved about where it is needed and to offer a few suggestions for the wide variety of uses to which a tractor can be put. By using his ingenuity, he can find scores of other ways of using the power which he has at hand in his tractor."

More than a dozen Fordson tractors will be used in the exhibit. The ease with which a tractor can be adapted to nearly any purpose on the farm is one of the big points to be brought out at Mr. Ford's model farm.
