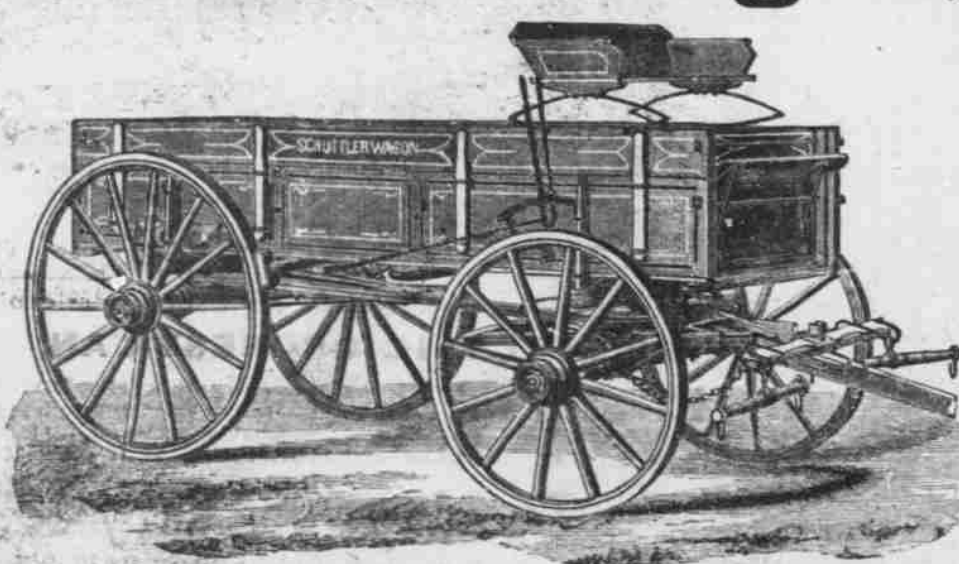

ISON'S STORE.

The Trade Center of an old Settlement in Henry County. With Stories of its Citizens and Talk About Fine Quadrupeds.

Cathey's Creek is a fine stream which gorges amid the rocks and past pebbles and sandy shores, and nineteen miles from Columbia it adds beauty to a little bit of a village known as Ison's Store.

The way to Ison's Store, from Columbia, is to Hampshire and then to three miles up and down all the way; but there are several farms without boulder attachments and they have big reputations for crops, when not suffering from drought, which for the last two years has depleted considerably every pocket book in the section.

THE KITRELL FARM.

In the early part of the present century the Kittrell family located here with the Cathey's, after which the creek is named. Their descendants are prominent people, physically as well as socially.

"Cleveland" is also a five year old and has gained a mile in his little hind legs. He is 16 1/2 hands high; color dark brown, with splendid mane and tail. A lady can drive him and he goes to the saddle, Cleveland is by Brooks Jr., he by Black Prince, he by Pilot Jr., Brooks Junior's last name is Story's Old Traveller, and Cleveland's last dam was by Mansfield's Old Traveller.

Prince Rupert is a deep blue long eared three year old, bred by Pruett's reported Leon, first dam by Younger's "Morocastle"—second dam by Younger's "Morocastle"—third dam by Old Black Warrior, imported. With the balance are seven Jennetts and three youngsters by Hub Hill, and any amount of mules, getting fatter every day.

W. A. Kittrell is also a merchant at Ison's with a store containing 4000 stock, and his clerk John B. Wiley is a pushing and attentive to business gentleman. The other store is that of Saterfield & Jones. They also carry 4000 worth of goods. In a grand handsome building, W. G. Saterfield was born in Williamson county and owns several thousands dollars worth of real estate at Ison's. He is a postmaster.

Erasmus Jones is popularly called "Boss," and owns a stock farm saw mill and store at Farmers Valley in Perry County, and is always a most pleasant gentleman to meet.
