### D. H. S. BOWS TO H. F.; CENTRAL COMES FRIDAY

Dickson Central High for the first time this season drank the bitter draught of defeat in baseball at McKean Park Saturday afternoon of last week, the same being administered by the strong clan from Hume-Fogg High School; the score being 5 and 1.

Not a harder played game of ball has been exhibited in the local park this season—no more sensational pitcher's battle between two artists of like ability. And it was a bitter pill, from fandom point of view, at least, to see the visitors come under the wire ahead, after such strong pitching of Bryan in an effort to keep the local Hi's perfect percentage safe! But, sportsmanlike, the local clan cheerfully bowed to the superiority of their strongest rivals. For it must be admitted that the work of Hume-Fogg's entire team had a slight edge on that of D. H. S.—in fact, not many brilliant fielding has been exhibited against the locals this season. It was a big day for each man at his position, and it was this pretty work that robbed Dickson of many hits that otherwise did not figure in the box score.—for Kain, Hume-Fogg's best, was touched much frequently than Bryan for D. H. S. Bryan outclass ed the former in sensational pitching, he being more steady in box when runs were threatening, and he also set 12 men down via the strike-out route. Main only struck out 4 and allowed 5 hits, with Bryan 7. There were no spectacular feats connected with the contest, no sensational batting—Kain's two banger being the longest hit made. But for the locals' one bad inning which allowed two, unearned runs to be charged up against them, the score would have been in narrower proportion and would have been a much more prettier game; however, regardless, the contest furnished a bathtub of enthusiasm for the large crowd of spectators present, and the work of the local team, aside from that lone inning, was indeed creditable. Locke, Donegan, Bryan and C. Scott were the onlyfortunates to register hits against the visitors, Locke getting two. ### GENERAL CLEAN-UP ORDERED BY COUNCIL

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held Monday night the City Marshal was instructed to see that the alleys in the business section of the town were cleaned up and all rubbish hauled off. It was also ordered that all yards and alleys in the residence section be cleaned and the trash placed in barrels, boxes or sacks so that same can be conveniently gotten to and hauled off.

Last fall quite a number of sidewalks were put in and orders issued for others, but bad weather set in and they could not go ahead with them. Several have already put in walks this Spring and it was suggested that this work be taken up at once so that by fall all sidewalks will built.

The question of buying a new engine and electric equipments was again taken up and freely discussed. The committee appointed to get bids, however, asked for more time, so as to give the matter a more thorough investigation before placing an order which was granted and the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the Mayor.
