CHAUTAQUA PROGRAM JUNE 15-20.

The irresistible comedy drama, "Friendly Enemies," Solis Marimba Band of spirited Central American musicians; lectures of timely significance, and top notch musical companies—these are among the many varied attractions which will appear here at the big 1929 Repath Chautauqua which opens Thursday, June 15 and continues for five days.

The New England Quartet on the first afternoon will be heard in a grand concert. This organization features some of the best songs for male voices interspersed with capital character impersonations and monologues.

Following a prelude by the quartet in the evening, Lewis A. Convis will deliver his remarkably interesting address, "Under the Paw of the Russian Bear." Mr. Convis, who is a traveler, lecturer and scholar, recently spent two years in Russia and Siberia.

The Alexander Trio, popular entertainment company presenting novel and artistic instrumental numbers, character sketches, and songs, on the second day will give a grand concert in the afternoon and a prelude at night. The Trio features melody and fun in admirable proportion.

Frank Dixon, eminent publicist and lecturer, appearing on the second night, speaks on "The Indispensable Tools of Democracy." Mr. Dixon is an incisive, brilliant, humorous speaker who presents governmental and social problems constructively and with magnetism.

The Zedeler Symphonic Quintet, appearing on the third day, is an organization of first rank artist-musicians. They employ a cello, two violins, a piano, and a read organ in their delightful interpretations of the music of the masters. Soprano solos supplement the instrumental selections on their exceptional programs. The Zedellers give a grand concert in the afternoon and a prelude at night.

Granville Jones, inspiring orator and thorough student of present-day social phenomena, on the third night will present one of his greatest lectures, "The Creed of America." Mr. Jones leaves a distinct impression on every community.

Furnishing the Home Beautiful, as discussed by Kevin W. Unangst, authority on interior decoration, will be the unusually interesting program offering of the fourth afternoon. Mr. Unangst will describe and exhibit on the stage attractive, inexpensive interiors, and will conduct a question box at the close of his lecture, discussing individual problems of house furnishing.

On the fourth night comes "Friendly Enemies," an uproarious comedy drama whose plot grows out of the convictions of two life-long friends. Audiences in all parts of the United States have alternately laughed and wept over this well-known comedy success. It will be presented by a cast of exceptionally competent New York actors.

On the last afternoon Pattison Kline will give a constructive address "What Do You Think When You Think?" Mr. Kline is an inspiring speaker of the highest type.

On the last night will be presented the big musical novelty feature of the Chautauqua—a grand concert by Solis Marimba Band of Central Americans. They will feature both classical and popular music on a huge marimba—an Attec instrument capable of an almost infinite variety of orchestral effects. The band will also give a short concert preceding Mr. Kline's lecture in the afternoon.
