Whiteville Tenn. } Feb. 10th, 1882. } Mr. Editor:—For the benefit of the farmers, and farmer's sons, who do not know how to graft fruit trees. I will give what little information I know about the art. In the first place, vigorous stocks should be selected. They should be raised from the roots of apple trees. My plan is to take up the plants and cut them off a couple of inches above the roots and then split the stock about 1 and a half inches and then train the graft in the shape of a wedge having them about 4 inches long. The bark of the graft should be even with that of the stock on one side, or if the graft is of the same size of the stock so much the better as the bark will be more apt to unite. After the graft is put into the stock, my plan is to wrap yarn thread closely around and up over the top of the stock where it is cut off and then to smear it over with mud. After having several ready my plan is to set them out in rows leaving about one third of the top or graft out. I have had success in grafting from the middle of February until the middle of May. A great many farmers I think would raise more apple if they only knew how to graft. As fruit nurseries are generally inconvenient and the trees cost money to get them is one reason or two reasons why the farmers do not raise more apples. They can raise apples without any expense excepting their labor and time. Time spent in grafting is time well spent, if any person choose to give better information let us hear from him.
