### THE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY.

Fry, Pafford, Greer, Watson, and Camp Secure the Nominations.

The Democratic primaries held in this county last Saturday passed off quietly and a heavy vote was polled in every district. It was the largest vote ever polled in a primary in Benton County, and indicates the general interest felt in the result of the contest.

Mr. E. E. Fry received the nomination for sheriff, his plurality being 222. His opponents in the race were Messrs. A. N. Lindsey and Ja-hugh Moore.

Mr. H. C. Pafford was endorsed for a second term for register by a plurality of 152, defeating Messrs. J. M. Herrin, J. E. Brown and Lem Jones.

Mr. G. B. Greer was endorsed for a second term as county court clerk, defeating Mr. W. A. Steels by a majority of 255.

Mr. L. R. Watson is the nominee for circuit court clerk, his plurality being 46, defeating E. E. McDaniel, T. W. Cuff, O. A. Utley and A. M. Hawley, jr.

Mr. J. T. Camp, who has made a popular official, had no opposition for the nomination for trustee, and received a handsome majority.

We publish elsewhere a tabulated statement of the vote by districts. The total vote polled in the fifth district was 290.

The total vote polled for sheriff was 1,498, a gain of 134 over the Democratic vote of 1896.

The following is a comparison of the vote of the primary (taking the vote for sheriff as a basis) and the vote for Bryan in 1896: First district, gain 24; second, loss 5; third, gain 27; fourth, gain 17; fifth, gain 17; sixth, loss 3; seventh, gain 13; eighth, gain 5; ninth (Faxon), gain 19; ninth (Clement), loss 31; tenth, gain 21; eleventh, gain 16; twelfth, gain 18; thirteenth, loss 11; fourteenth, gain 7.
