APPLE ROOT LOUSE.

Frequent inquiries have come to the University this spring about a whitish woolly substance found on the roots and sometimes in the bark crevices of apple trees. This is the woolly aphid or apple root louse and it is liable to become a serious pest in apple orchards, especially where the trees are not making a vigorous growth.

Being a sucking insect it is not affected by arsenical poisoning, and as it passes part of its life below the surface of the soil it is difficult to overcome. The aerial form does not do much damage, but below ground it causes swellings of the root, the injury resulting being similar to that caused by phylloxera in grapes.

Hot water, at nearly the boiling point, applied round the collar of the tree after removing the surface soil, is an inexpensive remedy. Enough must be used to soak into the soil for a depth of a foot tobacco dust, from two to five pound per tree, scattered over the main roots after removing the surface of the soil, is reported a remedy, and is also a preventive, while being a good fertilizer. Tobacco dust can be bought at \$20 per ton of the larger factories. The division of entomology has issued a valuable circular on this insect.
