THE CENTENNIAL.

We think Marion County should have an exhibit in the exposition at Nashville either in conjunction with Sequatchie and Bledsoe counties representing the Sequachee Valley, or alone. There may be objections to the county being in line with other counties in the State, there may be a prejudice that the exhibition will help Davidson county more than any other, but we cannot see any valid reason why Marion County so full of natural gifts and so replete with mineral wealth should hesitate to show to the world what she has within her limits.

We shall never be found in the ranks of those who discourage enterprise, nor shall we question the purposes of the Justices of the Peace who hesitated to appropriate the peoples' money for the purposes of an exhibit and we hope that the intervening time since their meeting in January and the next Court to be holden will have afforded them a chance to carefully consider what effect an exhibit would have and whether it is necessary for the welfare of the County to do anything to show it in its proper light, and therefore we expect that they will be in better condition to consider when the matter comes again before them.

In the mean time the Commissioners who we understand still hold their appointments should be preparing plans so that when called upon, they can give tangible and logical information.

A small appropriation from the County with the private enterprises and subscription which we believe can be obtained, would, we believe, prepare an exhibit of which we would all feel proud, but if the county has none, who can apologize for it?

THE NEWS wants an exhibit and its columns are open for the intelligent understanding of the matter. If anyone objects, let us know why. Or, if any plan is ready, let the people know it.

ONE hears constantly of new colonies being started throughout the South. If there are so many, why cannot one be started in this section. We have the resources but they are undeveloped.

THE South needs the money of good, honest, well-meaning men, and not that of speculators.

Grapes, and Peaches

Around Hamlet (says the Charlotte, N. C., Democrat) the country is not very inviting. It is flat and swampy, though backed at a good distance by first-class farming lands. But boarding a train for Southern Pines, you may prepare yourself to see the prettiest farming in the south. On the right and on the left, the broad, level sandy fields extend into space beyond where the eye can see. Ten years ago the barren lands or sand hills, as they were called, were a sore on the progress of North Carolina. But to-day it is not true. There is where North Carolina is making most rapid progress.

The first field of interest is a large vineyard. As far as the eye can see vines are twining around vertical posts. The posts are nothing more than short fence rails driven into the ground. They are about eight feet apart each way. When the vine is small and tender, it is trained to circle around the post and is aided by a string which is tied to the top and then around the post. To look at the vines one would think some bad boy had been in there with his hatchet; but, no, it is the work of the pruner. He cuts about one-fourth of the vines off each year—keeps it trimmed back. That makes the fruit grow
