SLIGHT DECLINE IN PRICE OF POULTRY, EGGS STEADY—CATTLE AND SHEEP SLOW.

made by the committees.
Dr. S. L. Morris, secretary of the

assembly's home missions of Atlanta, delivered a masterly address on the church's mission work both home and foreign.

His statement showed that for one of these caused named by him, in nineteen years had increased from \$26,000 to more than a half million dollars. He also referred to the fact that but one denomination gives a

larger per capita to missions than the Presbyterians.

At the session this morning, memorial services were conducted for J. Addison Smith, D. D., of Murfreesboro, and J. Edmund Brown, of Jackson. Addressing addresses were made by several ministers present.

The report of the committee on the Monroe Harding Children's home at

Nashville was received, and was most gratifying. Miss Fuller, matron of this institution was present. For a number of years Miss Fuller has met with gratifying success in the management of this home.

At 11 o'clock this morning, Dr. Jas. I. Vance, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Nashville, preached to a well filled church. His subject was

"Victory Through Faith" and the closest attention was given him as he delivered a most interesting sermon.

It was thought that the sessions of the Synod would probably come to a close this afternoon or tonight, as business has been handled with dispatch, and unless there are unforeseen developments the work of the Synod will shortly be concluded.
