CENSUS SHOWS BIG INCREASE IN STATE'S CATTLE

NUMBER IN TENNESSEE 309,000 ABOVE THAT REPORTED IN FORMER DECADE.

BUT SHEEP HAVE BEEN REDUCED

Mules Have Gained Since 1910. But There Has Been a Big Reduction in the Number of Horses—Nearly Half Million Dairy Cows.

(From Saturday's Daily Herald.)
The director of census announced today that the following preliminary figures from the census of agriculture for Tennessee:

Of the 252,754 farms in Tennessee, 252,681 report live stock. Horses are reported to 140,714, mules by 112,571, cattle by 239,522, sheep by 124,844 and pigs by 204,567.

The number of horses in Tennessee is 140,714, which includes 297,258 horses two years old and over, 142,204 colts from 1 to 2 years old and 14,305 colts under 1 year old. Their total value reported for horses is \$25,561,533, an increase of \$4,132,438 from 1910. The number of horses in 1910 (excluding mules) was 111,910 (excluding mules) in order to make a fair comparison with figures for animals 1, 1920 was 112,924.

The number of mules is 112,571, including 64,371 colts under one year old. The total value for mules is \$11,250,255, the total value of dairy cows is \$22,032, an increase of \$4,132,438 from 1910. The number of cattle in 1910 (excluding spring calves) was 192,912.

Of the 361,196 sheep in the state, 55,922 are lambs under one year old, 281,774 ewes one year old and over, and 29,500 rams and wethers. The total value reported for sheep is \$4,021,678, an increase of \$1,000,000 from 1910. The number of sheep in 1910 (excluding spring lambs) was 129,312.

The total production of milk in 1919, was 120,283,961 gallons, as compared with 129,455,992 gallons in 1909. The production of beef in 1919 was 1,233,212 pounds, as compared with 1,089,425 pounds of beef in 1909. The number of chickens raised that year was 18,541,194.

The value of all dairy products, including home uses of milk and cream, was \$26,000,842, an increase of \$18,000,000 of chickens raised in 1919, 1,010,000.

Domestic animals kept by citizens having city licenses and drivers' licenses were reported as follows: Horses, 14,995 in 1926, as compared with 12,753 in 1910; mules, 11,729 in 1926 and 11,279 in 1910; cattle, 19,948 in 1926 and 19,200 in 1910; sheep, 135,514 in 1926 and 127,700 in 1910.

LOWER PRICES FOR CORN ARE EXPECTED

LOCAL DEALERS WILL PROBABLY REDUCE QUOTATIONS IN LINE WITH CHICAGO.

It is expected that next week will see a decline in the local corn market. Dealers are still holding their quotations at \$1.10 a barrel, or eight cents a bushel, but with such corn selling at a price of \$2.40 a barrel, or 16 cents a bushel, and December futures down to \$2.30 a barrel they admit that the local market is out of line and freely predict a decline unless the Chicago market should show strength that is not displayed. Farmers are slow to sell at \$1 a barrel, but there seems to be little hope of getting that price for long.

HOLIDAY TURKEY CROP OF COUNTY ABOUT \$50,000

FARMERS WIVES WILL GET ABOUT THAT SUM FOR THANKSGIVING BIRDS.

But Quality Has Been Good and the Money Has Been Widely Distributed As Very Few Large Flocks Are Grown in This Section.

Turkey shipments for the Thanksgiving trade will be practically over at the end of this week. The shipments from the county have been light, less in volume than last year and less than the average for recent years past. It is believed that a conservative estimate of the turkey shipments for the holiday trade would not exceed 150,000 pounds. At thirty cents per pound, the price received by the farmers, this means that the turkey money of the county for Thanksgiving is about \$45,000. It might run as high as \$50,000 but it is certain in the opinion of well posted dealers that such a sum would be an over-estimate.
