There were about two hundred of the best people of Union City in the party. It was Katy M's day and delegations were there from Tennessee, Kentucky and Mississippi.

The Boosters Special was used for the purpose of advertising Union City and the Fourth of July celebration, and when they reached Jackson formed in the parade with the Second Tennessee Regiment Band leading. The band accompanied them on the trip. Outside of Jackson the Union City line was the largest in the parade and outside of the Jackson band the Second Tennessee Band was a winner. After enjoying the sights in Jackson until 3.30 o'clock the party boarded the train for the return trip. No stops were made going down, but returning stops were made at every point, including Humboldt, Trenton, Dyer, Rutherford, Kenton, Rives. At every one of these places the party alighted and visited the business portion of town and the band entertained the citizens with music.
