LARGE ATTENDANCE.

West Tennessee Fair Association Has a Remarkably Successful Meeting.

An Average of 5,000 People a Day Enter the Grounds Receipts About Cover Last Year's Misfortune And Current Expenses.

The Fourth Annual Meeting of the West Tennessee Fair Association came to a close last Saturday. There were four days full of pleasure and profit. Everybody was in a good humor and everyone enjoyed the show. There was a feast of attractions on the grounds and at the theatre. On the first day at least 2,000 school children were in attendance, and the scene was inspiring altogether. Bright faces and frocks and shouting boys caught the eye and ear. They marched to the grounds, each school with its badges, requiring probably two hours or more to pass through the gates, marching to the Woman's Building, then through the midway to the grandstand.

On Friday, Governor's Day, Gov. Patterson and his escort, led by the Second Tennessee Regiment Band and Company E, U. C. V., marched to the fair grounds at 1 o'clock. When the procession reached the grandstand an ovation awaited them. A platform had been made and the governor was welcomed by Senator McRee. Governor Patterson's address followed, and it abounded with warm and cordial greetings to the good people of Obion County. He spoke in flattering terms of our citizens, paying the highest compliments. He eulogized our institutions, our commercial interests and agricultural industries. He spoke of the public spirit and achievements of the officers and stockholders of the fair association. He was very kind and generous, especially so to the ladies. He loved Obion County—he couldn't help it. The address was received with long and wholesome applause.

A visit to the departments showed that the exhibits were varied and of the highest merit and standard. They were all complete, but none so large and attractive as the Woman's building. Here was demonstrated the fact that effort brings its reward. No department of the fair has been so thoroughly and constantly developed as the department of fine arts, domestic arts, culinary and floriculture, and no such exhibits have ever before been seen in Union City. The ladies deserve the largest measure of credit, so also does Mr. Massey, who had charge of the floral exhibit.

A new departure for Union City business men was the arrangement of booths in different parts of the Woman's Building for display and advertising purposes. In the center of the main entrance was the First National Bank exhibit, with Cashier Walter Howell in charge. Mr. Howell had a case showing bank and treasury notes of various denominations, ranging from one dollar to one thousand dollars. A one-thousand dollar note was the most conspicuous and attractive part of the display.

Further to the left was the Bransford & Andrews booth, a very creditable display by the dependable jewelers and opticians, including watches, silverware, jewelry, diamonds, cut glass, hand-painted china, etc. Mr. Bransford or Mr. Lee were here to meet the visitors.

Next was the attractive exhibit of stoves, ranges, fancy and hand-painted china, cut glass, etc. Over this department was J. C. McRee, giving practical demonstrations with the Monarch Oil Stove, one of the best in the market. This was a great drawing card for the Nailing-Keiser Hardware Co.

Close by was the irresistible and irrepressible Charley Denham with a new consignment of Meyer Bros' goods, including the fine coffee, and Charley gave a cup of hot coffee to every thirsty individual who would accept the favor.

The Bell Furniture Company had a well arranged display, including a fine bronze bedstead, trimmed and complete with mattress and white counterpane, inlaid tables and plate mirrors, tastefully planned and neatly executed by Mr. Bell, who was in charge.

There are no more enterprising merchants than Morgan-Verhine Co., and in charge of a well designed booth was J. K. Murphy, who has made a very flattering reputation in the advertising line. In the display were druggets, rugs, ladies' garments, millinery, fancy notions, etc., a very creditable exhibit of the Morgan-Verhine Company lines.
