CALEB POWERS CASE UP AGAIN.

For the fourth time Caleb Powers was put on trial at Georgetown, Scott County, Monday, for alleged complicity in the assassination of Senator William Goebel, Democratic aspirant for the Governorship of Kentucky in 1900. Goebel was shot Jan. 30, 1900, dying Feb. 3, 1900 from the wounds. The fatal bullet is alleged to have come from the office of Caleb Powers, Secretary of State under Republican Governor Taylor, and although he was in Louisville on the day the shooting occurred, it charged that he loaned others the key to his office so that the murderer or murderers of Goebel could stand by his window.

Powers denies this, and declares he had nothing to do with the shooting. Powers charges the juries heretofore trying him have been composed mostly of Democrats, and that he was not given fair trials. Considerable new testimony is expected to be brought out at the coming trial.
