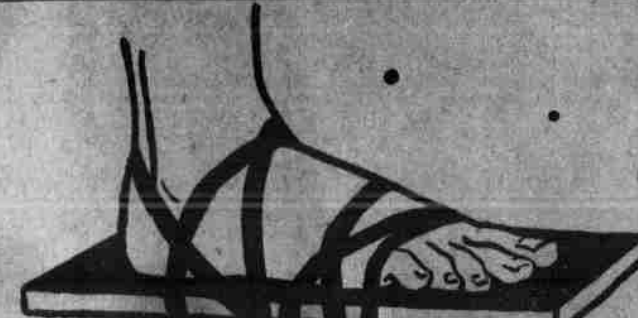
Greatest Berkshire Show.
