The Fly Menace.
 The time of the year has arrived when special effort should be made in the city to suppress the house fly, or, as it should be more properly termed, the typhoid fly. The movement begun last summer in Nashville to exterminate the fly was mainly educational, but it was followed by good results. Public attention was directed to the evil of the fly and to the various means available for protection against the infection caused by the fly and also to the necessity of more general and concerted action upon the part of the people to exterminate the nuisance. The more general use of screens has been encouraged, and the matter of screening should be insisted upon earnestly this year.
 The health authorities have been active in this respect, and are constantly ready to aid in fly extermination as far their limited means and agencies will permit, but it is important that house-keepers and the public generally should also be active in adopting all available means to prevent the production of flies. In this work cleanliness of premises is all important. Mayor Howse has urged the importance of hearty co-operation in the work of "Clean-up Week," and Health Officer Hibbett is doing all in his power in promoting a policy of city cleanliness. Cleanliness is the keynote of all sanitation, and careful attention to the removal of dirt and all obnoxious matter throughout the spring and summer will be some of the surest safeguards against the infectious fly.—Nashville Banner.
