**After Liquor Sellers.**

Tiptonville, Tenn., Aug. 24.—A law and order league was organized at the courthouse in this city yesterday afternoon with the following elected as officers: J. R. Lambert, president; J. H. Smith, vice president; Rev. Fred Peoples, vice president, and Hale Tipton, secretary and treasurer. Several speeches were made and much enthusiasm was shown. The object of the league is to try and suppress the illegal sale of liquors in Lake County, which has been going on on such a large scale. Attorney-General Caldwell is heartily endorsing the procedures of the league and Attorney Sam Williams, of Dyersburg, has been employed to aid local attorneys in prosecuting liquor violators. The blind tigers are on a standstill at present, as a recent raid has been tipped off and they are apparently closed.
