FAIR CLOSED SATURDAY WITH SPLENDID SUCCESS

Fine Attendance Throughout and Good Meeting.

As stated last week the fair here was comparatively a good one, notwithstanding the effects of the war in this country and the shortage of crops for two or three years. The attendance was large, almost as any of our meetings. The horse show was hardly so large as that of two years ago, but it compared favorably with former fairs. The agricultural exhibit was the largest we have ever had, much larger, and the display excelled any ever seen in the county. This was the work of Mr. A. Harris, who has taken considerable interest in the work for several years. The Woman's Building was interesting—not so full, but contained some very fine specimens.

Quite a number of visitors from other cities were here during the meeting, and the social features were probably better than any of the former meetings.
