**STOCKHOLDERS IN LAND BANK GET DIVIDEND**  
Louisville, Ky., November 11.—A six per cent dividend to stockholders on earnings in excess of operating expenses for the year 1920 was declared by the directors of the Federal Land Bank at Louisville. The dividend amounted to \$78,000, and it goes to approximately 9,000 stockholders or borrowing farmers of Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio and Tennessee, in which the State bank operates.
