LIONS CLUB DINNER MEETING NEXT TUESDAY

Representative S. B. Bratton to Be Honored.

The Lions Club of Union City will devote its regular dinner meeting next Tuesday to a reception for Representative S. B. Bratton, Senator E. F. LeDuke and Representative Claiborne, and all the Justices of the Peace of Obion County are cordially invited to be the guests of the club on that occasion. The dinner will be given at the Palace Hotel in Union City Tuesday, Dec. 28, at 12:30 p.m.

The purpose of this meeting is to confer relative to the public interests of Obion County, especially the road law and county highways, and the members of the County Court are expected to be the best posted judges of these matters and to take an active interest in the conference.

There is also to be proposed an inquiry relative to the cost of public highways and what these highways should cost the people of Tennessee. The club does not propose to take any action in these matters but to have them presented to the public so that they may go to the proper authorities for action.

SHIELDS BELIEVES

GARRETT IS SAFE

Senator Looks for His Confirmation as Federal Judge.

Knoxville, Tenn., Dec. 20.—United States Senator John K. Shields believes that the nomination of Congressman Finis J. Garrett as Federal Judge for the Memphis District will be confirmed in the Senate when it comes up for vote.

Stopping over here en route from Washington to his home in Grainger County, Senator Shields in an interview expressed the opinion that the opposition of certain successful candidates at the recent election, who will not be Congressmen until after March 4, will not prevail against the confirmation of Congressman Garrett, nominated by President Wilson to be the United States Judge in West Tennessee, whom he said many Republicans in the Senate are supporting. "They are not Congressmen yet," the Senator remarked.

The time will come when these Congressmen-elect will want something at the hands of the Senate which they will not be able to get without the assistance of Democrats, Senator Shields stated.

Senator Shields stated that with the passage of the water power bill, which he introduced in the Senate, all obstacles and obstructions that lay in the way of enterprise and capital in the development of vast water power potentialities in Tennessee, and especially in East Tennessee, are removed. Nothing remains to oppose this development but the difficulties of nature itself, he added.

Senator Shields spoke highly of Congressman Garrett in discussing his nomination, saying that he is an exceptionally able lawyer and has a splendid judicial mind and temperament.

24 BILLIONS NET COST OF WAR.

Washington, D. C.—The net cost of the war to the American government was fixed by Secretary Houston at \$24,010,000,000. This, he said, represented the "adjusted" expenditures of the treasury, excluding all other outlay which had no relation to the actual prosecution of the war from the period from April 6, 1917, to June 30, last, which, he said, covered the extremes of the government's war time fiscal operations.

Total expenditures by the government during the period covered excepting only postal disbursements from postal revenues were \$38,830,812,895, treasury figures showed. Of this amount, \$16,070,844,097 was obtained in taxes and revenue from sources other than borrowed money.

Mr. Houston said a deduction of \$9,523,000,000, the amount loaned to foreign governments, should be made from the grand total since these loans will be repaid and consequently can not be charged as an actual expenditure. The secretary made other deductions aggregating approximately \$4,500,000,000 which he said represented the excess cost of actual governmental operations for the three years and three months over what they would have been in normal times.

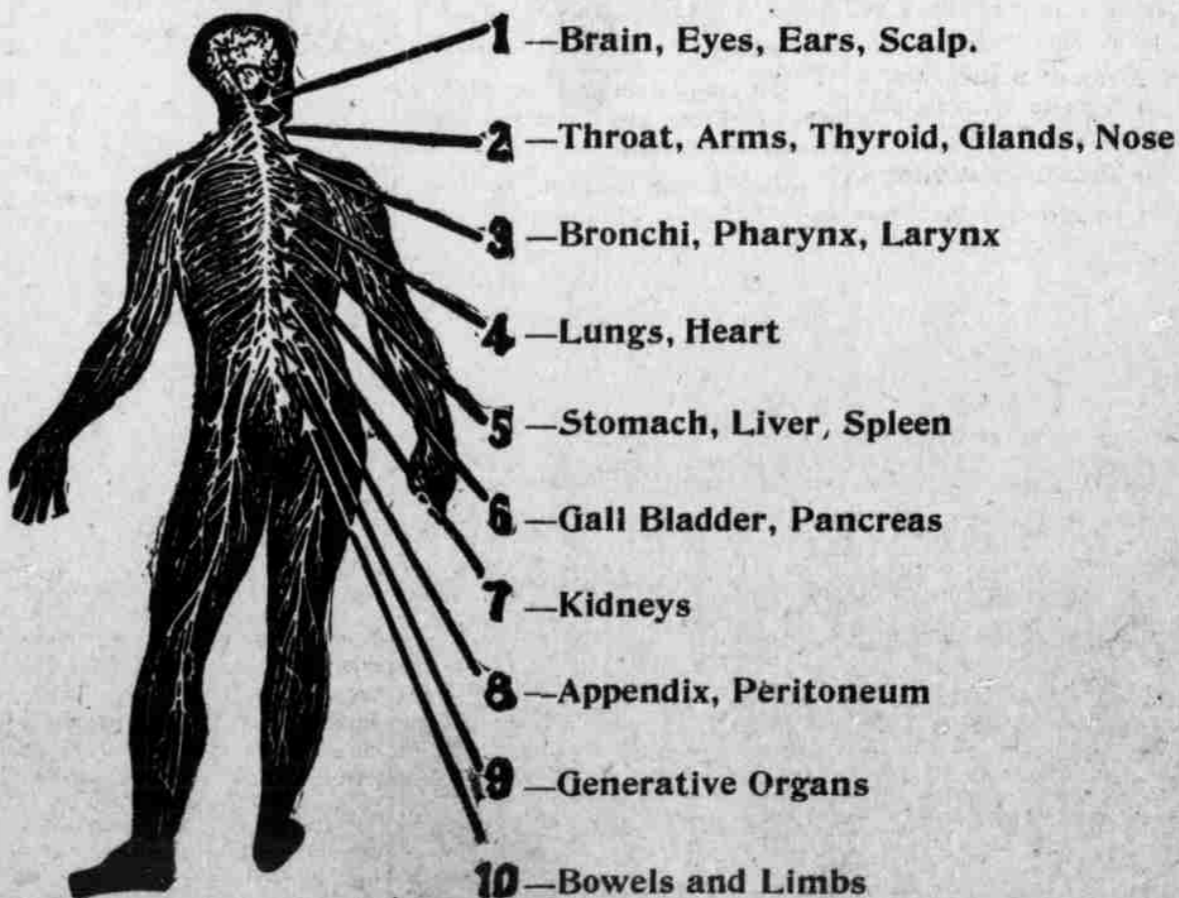
