An ordinance to repeal street improvement ordinances as follows: Street Improvement Ordinance No. 1 for the improvement of First street in Union City, Tennessee from the south line of Harrison street to the north line of Main street in said town, all of said section of said street to be improved by repairing, curbing, guttering and paving with asphaltic concrete on concrete foundation and doing all necessary work incident to such improvement; passed May 17th, 1921, confirmed June 7th, 1921;

Street Improvement Ordinance No. 2 for the improvement of Main street in the town of Union City, Tennessee, from the east line of First street to the west line of Ury street in said town, all of said section of said street to be improved by repairing, curbing, guttering and paving with asphaltic concrete on concrete foundation and doing all necessary work incident to such improvement; passed May 17th, 1921, confirmed June 7th, 1921;

Street Improvement Ordinance No. 3 for the improvement of Ury street in the town of Union City, Tennessee, from the south line of Mill street to the north line of Cheatham street in said town, all of said section of said street to be improved by repairing, curbing, guttering and paving with asphaltic concrete on concrete foundation and doing all necessary work incident to such improvement; passed May 17th, 1921, confirmed June 7th, 1921;

Street Improvement Ordinance No. 4 for the improvement of First street in the town of Union City, Tennessee, from the north line of Main street to the north line of Palmer street in said town, all of said section of said street to be improved by repairing, curbing, guttering and paving with asphaltic concrete on concrete foundation and doing all necessary work incident to such improvement; passed May 3d, 1922;

And Street improvement ordinance No. 5, to provide for the improvement of Church street in the town of Union City, Tennessee, from the west line of Fifth street to the east line of Cemetery street in said town, all of said section of said street to be improved by repairing, curbing, guttering and paving with asphaltic concrete on concrete foundation and doing all necessary work incident to such improvement; passed May 19th, 1922.

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Matinee Music Club.

The Matinee Music Club culminated its study program for the season on Saturday afternoon at the home of Miss Hattie Mai Clemmons, Rives, the final subject being "Indian Music," with an interesting discourse on "Folk Music of the Red Man" by the leader, Miss Willie Belle Mays.

A pleasing feature of the meeting was the splendid report from the Tennessee Federation of Music Clubs of the past week's convention at Paris, Tenn., given by Miss Edith Quinn, the club representative to the State Federation. Miss Quinn was especially gratified to report the high standing of the Union City Matinee Music Club in the federated body. In appropos of such honorable ranking, a brief recapitulation of the activities of the past club season may be presented:

The club has had a most successful year under the direction of its president, Mrs. Thad Lee. With a primary object—and that to develop and promote local talent, its unit of membership, consisting of twenty zealous musicians, compose an organization that has been termed a minute example of artistry. The general topic of study for the year, "Phases of Music," has been one of the most interesting ever conducted by the club. It has included the following subjects: "Musical Life," "Music of Wonderland," "Art Music," "Humorous Music," "Music of the Seasons," "Negro Lore and Spirituals," "Indian Music." These subjects have been harmoniously reinforced at each meeting with a musical program in keeping with the study outline.

The Matinee Music Club has devoted much time and thought to community work. Many calls from the civic commissions of the city are being answered, and realizing the truth that music will always necessarily be something of a philanthropy, many community music movements have been carried on within the confines of the club membership. An outline of musical "first-aid" for the past year includes piano, voice and organ numbers as club contributions to many Sunday afternoon programs at city theatre, given under auspices of Christian Endeavor welfare work; also four presentations of an operetta, all for the benefit of city playgrounds; a benefit musicale given for community nurse, as well as other minor musical features contributed.

Realizing that the great mission of every musical club is to develop taste for good music, the Matinee Music Club has endeavored to fulfill its mission by rendering a two-fold service, namely, that of creating wholesome musical ideals as well as giving aid to the material needs of humanity.
