

**SENATOR K. D. MCKELLAR
SPENDS EVENING IN CITY**

Arrives During the Afternoon. Meets Friends at the Palace.

K. D. McKellar, United States Senator from Tennessee, was in Union City Tuesday and spent several hours mingling with friends and talking democracy. On account of the union revival at the C. P. Church, he did not attempt to speak but early in the evening he dismissed the small crowd gathered at the court house and invited them to attend the meeting at the church.

He spoke at Dyersburg Monday and at Tiptonville Monday night. He is in the field to remain until after the November election.

In his regular speech he makes a strong appeal for the election of Hon. Austin Peay as Governor, and explains the necessity of having a Governor of the same political complexion as the General Assembly. He says that Peay is honest, fearless and stands for what he thinks is right. He wants to see an old time Democratic majority rolled up. He says that the Republican party has demonstrated its incompetency to run the government and cites the many bad party breaks during the past 18 months that Congress has been in session. During that time only one important bill has been passed, that the tariff bill. He says that in spite of this iniquitous bill Congress has given the President power to add three million dollars more tax by increased tariffs. He commends Senator Borah for being one broad-minded Republican, honest enough to vote against such a ridiculous bill. He thinks Congress and the administration have failed in their promise to bring normalcy to the country; they have failed to bring prosperity; they have cut us off from foreign trade; they have destroyed our merchant marine; they have failed in the restoring of normalcy to the coal mines and to the railroads.

Death Near Crystal.

Mrs. Anna Hudson Felts, aged 51 years, died Saturday morning at the home of her sister, Mrs. LaFayette Maupin, near Crystal, after several weeks illness of goitre. When a young woman she was married to a Mr. Felts, who died a number of years ago. Mrs. Felts during the past several years has made her home in Union City, being connected with the sewing department of the Jackson Company. Some weeks ago she de-

ided to pay a visit to her sister, where she remained during her last illness.

She was a daughter of J. B. and Mary Levisa Hudson, who lived near Crystal. The mother died 22 years ago and the father passed away about six years ago. One brother, C. E. Hudson, died about 18 years ago. She is survived by three sisters and four brothers—Mrs. Etta Cloar, Mrs. Lou Cloar, Mrs. Fate Maupin, H. M. Hudson, J. A. Hudson, W. W. Hudson, of this county, and E. Hudson, of Weakley County.

For a long time she had been a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The funeral service was held at Antioch conducted by Revs. Cunningham and White. The interment was at Antioch cemetery.

Death of Mrs. Haley.

Mrs. Nealey Haley, wife of William Haley, died at the family home in Number Seven last Friday morning. At the time of her death she was 39 years of age. She leaves a husband, three children and a host of good friends to mourn the loss of a good wife, mother and good true friend.

The funeral service was conducted at Cane Creek Church Saturday morning and the body interred at Cane Creek Cemetery.

A Sad Death.

A very sad death occurred in this city early Wednesday morning when Miss Brinnea Shapard, aged 19 years, daughter of Mrs. Belle Shapard, who lives, three miles west of Antioch, passed away.

The young lady had been very sick since Monday morning, suffering an obstruction of the intestines, and the family decided to remove her to this city for surgical treatment. The trip was made but the patient was too weak to stand the journey and died in a few minutes after reaching the Qualls sanitarium.

She is survived by her mother, two sisters and four brothers. The father, Charles Shapard, died a year or so ago.

The body was removed to the family home and the funeral service conducted at Antioch yesterday by Rev. Banks, attended by a large number of friends and neighbors.

Interment was at Antioch cemetery.
