Announcement in Union City Wednesday of the death of Mr. Spencer Thompson in Louisville, Ky., was heard with mingled shock and surprise.

Mr. Thompson was not sick more than a week with an attack of pneumonia. He died at 11:30 o'clock a.m. Wednesday, November 29, 1922.

Mr. Thompson was born and reared in the vicinity of Mount Zion in Obion County. He came to Union City and was engaged as a clerk and later as assistant cashier of the Third National Bank. He was married here to Miss Zella Moss, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry P. Moss. They moved to Dyersburg, where Mr. Thompson was connected with the Lake County Manufacturing Co., later being transferred to Louisville to the parent house, known as the Cotton Seed Products Co.

Mr. Thompson was the son of Mr. Arch Thompson and the surviving sisters and brothers are as follows: Mrs. John H. White, of Hickman, Ky.; Mrs. Paul Shaw, of State Line, Ky.; Harold Thompson, Memphis; Lee and Lawrence Thompson, of Number Two.

Mr. Thompson was a member of the Baptist Church and esteemed as one of the most sterling and reliable young men of Union City. He had many fine qualities and personalities which made him a good citizen and business man. He is survived by his wife and a little daughter, Catherine.

Remains were shipped to Union City, accompanied by Mrs. Thompson and Mr. Cecil Moss, due last night to be carried to the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Coss on Exchange street.
