Death of Mrs. Robt. L. Cloys.

Mrs. Maggie Cloys, wife of Robert L. Cloys, died at her home in Union City Monday morning, August 29, 1921, at 2 o'clock, after a short illness. Mrs. Cloys attended services at the Methodist Church Sunday evening and suffered a recurrence of heart illness, which had for some time given her trouble. She was taken home and lived only a few hours.

Mrs. Cloys was about forty-eight years of age. She was a sister of Mrs. Geo. Bufford, Mrs. Willie Hughes, Messrs. Sam and Seth Parkman, and is survived also by her husband and one child, her daughter, Mrs. R. E. Wood, and her mother, Mrs. Parkman.

Mrs. Cloys was a member of the Methodist Church at Mount Zion. She and Mr. Cloys were very active in Sunday school and church work. They were residents of Mount Zion vicinity for many years and located in Union City a short time back.

Services were conducted at Mount Zion, Revs. G. W. Evans and E. M. Mathis, in charge. Remains were interred at Mount Zion Cemetery.

Death of Dr. H. P. Catron.

Dr. Robert P. Catron was born in morning, August 29, 1921, at 5 o'clock, after an illness of general decline for a year or more.

Dr. Robert Catron was born in Sumner County, Tenn., in 1840. At the age of ten he came with his parents, Col. Hugh Catron and wife, to Obion County and the family located in the locality now known as Houser Valley, where Dr. Catron has continued to reside.

Dr. Catron was a graduate of medicine and for many years practiced his profession. At the breaking out of the Civil War Dr. Catron enlisted and went out with the Obion Avancher. He was a good soldier and a good citizen. He was married to Miss Lucy Capps and of the union four children survive as follows: Miss Phebe Catron, Mrs. J. T. Denning, Richard Catron, and Hugh Catron. There are also four sisters and a brother—Mrs. Buck Palmer, Mrs. Geo. Joyner, Mrs. Hugh Compton, Mrs. T. L. Bransford and John Catron.

Dr. Catron was a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. He was very strongly attached to the teachings of the Holy Word and gave much of his time to the study of the Scriptures. Dr. Catron lived quietly at home and enjoyed his family devotions. He was very pleasant in his relations to the neighbors and friends and was esteemed everywhere as a man of honor and character.

Funeral services were conducted at Beech Church Tuesday morning, by Rev. G. W. Purtillo, Dr. E. P. Ellison and W. B. Cunningham. Interment was held at Beech Cemetery.
