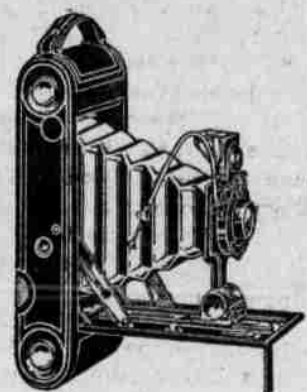
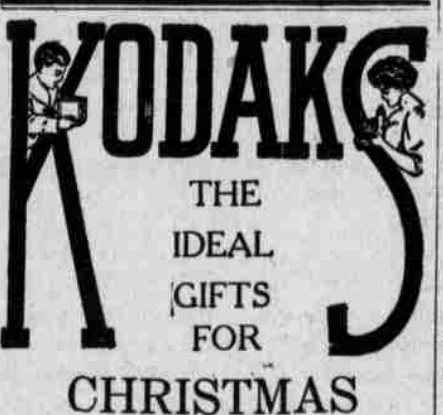
Special Election.
