Notice to Contractors for Ties.

Bids will be received at the office of the Tinsalia Coal and Iron Company, in Bristol, up to the 10th day of February, 1881, for 100,000 Crown-ties, to be delivered on the line of the Narrow Gauge Railroad between Bristol and Estillville.

This must be of the best quality of white oak or chestnut oak, exactly six feet long, and six inches thick, squared at the ends and tapered. No tie will be received if less than six inches in thickness, or less than six inches in length, if hewed or quartered. If sawed they must be 6x8 inches. Payment must be made in cash on delivery. No bid for less than \$5000 will be considered, that being the number to be used on a single mile. For the first five miles out of Bristol they must be delivered along the graded line of road, 3000 to the mile. Beyond that they will be received in lots of not less than 5000, on the roadside behind the track-laying train, where they can be picked up and hauled forward.

All the timber for ties must be cut before the 1st of April. Delivery must begin at Bristol not later than June 1st, and be completed as far as Estillville by July 1st.

Inspection will be made in the woods before they are hauled; and payment of 25 per cent. is made on inspection monthly, the remaining 75 per cent. will be paid in cash on every 3000, as delivered on the line.

Bidders will designate the particular miles they bid on.

Side-Walk Letter.

ON THE SIDE-WALK, 1 FEB. 1, 1881.

The rain has the side-walk to-day. Perhaps the ground may have it to-morrow. We have had a few days let up in the weather, but now I see no chance that he will see his shadow and run to his hole. If he does we can then go in our holes for six weeks. The new moon swings beautifully on her back, like a basket of silver. That means she will hold water (as no basket does) and that we shall have a wet February, or you can have it that she will hold the water and therefore spill none on us.

Maj. Wood is fitting up in nice style the new office for the Tinsalia Coal & Iron Co., in the Va. House, and will have it ready for Gen. Imboden on his return from N. C.

The surveys on the N. G. line are rapidly pressed forward. Capt. Winton's corps has completed the entire location of the line from Speer's Ferry to Linden-ville. The distance is 24 miles. Capt. Slicker's corps has located the Poor Valley section about half way from Mendota to Estillville. Before the end of the month the profiles will be ready, and then the line will be let to contract and graded in four months, so that trains will run to Estillville by the "glorious fourth." Capt. Waltheil's corps has reached the South Fork, near Rockhold's camp ground. A very good line has been found except that there is difficulty at the river. In fact there are several lines and it is uncertain which will be adopted.

The grading on the Bristol and Mendota section is progressing favorably. Capt. Dudley's force has about completed the grading to the river. Capt. Bibb is still held by the heavy cut at the head of Wolf Run, and the heavy fill in Rich Valley. It is estimated that the two convict forces will have enough to do to have the first 15 miles ready for the rails and ties by June first, when track laying will commence.

The good and enterprising people of Mendota will have a public meeting next Saturday to inaugurate that important work, the proposed road across Clinch Mountain to Scott and Russell. If our business men know on which side of their bed to look for the butter they will help to build that road speedily.

Mr. Isaac E. Rhea died last Saturday morning, a few minutes after midnight, aged 24, of Phthisis Pulmonalis. He leaves a wife and two little children.—He was buried last Sunday near his home on Walker's Mountain five miles north-west of Bristol, a vast number of people being present.
