NEW YORK.

New York, November 9.—The Erie

Railroad Company notified the Stock

Exchange today that at the expiration

of thirty days \$5,000,000 of convertible

bonds will be issued. These bonds are

known as the Narrow-Gauge Sinking

Fund bonds, and are issued for the

purpose of laying a third rail on the entire

track, in conformity with the agreement

made with the Lake Shore Company

some time since. This announcement

caused a decline on Vanderbilt

stocks, as it is looked upon as creating a

rivalry between the Erie and New York

Central roads.

It is announced that the injunctions

against the Gold Exchange Bank have

been vacated and discharged in all the

suits, and said suits have also been dis-

continued.

The following failures are announced:

White, Heath & Co., woolen goods job-

bers, liabilities \$150,000; Randolph

Brothers, woolen dealers, and Mixer,

Whitman & Co., starch manufacturers

and oil dealers. The liabilities of the

latter are very heavy. The rumors of the

failure of Condit, Jennings & Co.

are unfounded, and that of a small dry

goods house—name not stated—is prob-

ably correct.

LOUISVILLE.

Louisville, November 9.—At eight

o'clock last night, as the Express train

from Nashville was leaving Bacon Creek

station, Milton Cochran, a brakeman,

was shot and instantly killed by a man

supposed to have been concealed behind

a wood pile. The cause of the murder

is not ascertained.

Governor Stevenson has respited Wm.

Krel, the wife murderer, whose execu-

tion was fixed for November 19, until

December 17th. An application will be

made to the Legislature in the mean-

while to commute his sentence.

On Sunday evening a party of one

hundred men came to the New Rich-

mond (Kentucky) jail and took out a

man named Surey, the author of five

murders, and hung him in the courthouse

yard, with a placard on his back, not to

cut him down until seven o'clock Mon-

day evening. The crowd then dispersed.

Near Orchard Springs, in this

State, on Friday night, four men went

to a house of ill-repute to tear it down, but

finding some parties inside ready to

defend it, opened fire upon them with

Spencer rifles, and mortally wounded

George Faukesly, one of the inmates.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

CONCORD, November 9.—Josiah H.

Pike, who murdered Thomas Brown and

his wife, two aged persons, at Hampton

Falls, in May, 1868, was hanged to-day.
