Something New in Funerals.  
A Chicago Times correspondent writes from New York about funerals:  
The present innovation is to lay the body upon a couch, dressed in its accustomed clothing, with a pillow under the head. The position is usually that of right or left side, and the hands are arranged in some natural and easy position. If the dead is a lady, a handsome shawl is thrown over the figure, and if a man, an Afghan or silk quilt serves for a covering. Flowers are in the room, but not in such obtrusive abundance as to make the odor of these beautiful things haunt you forever afterwards. The funeral is announced, and the friends and acquaintances are invited to assist in the sad ceremony of burial. Loving hands lift and lower the casket, and tender ones strew the earth softly above it with flowers, and perhaps some favored wrappings of the dead are added to lie between the dust which usually falls so heavily and harshly upon that other dust that is so dear. No strange eyes witness the last sacred attention to the departed, and no memory of a thoughtless jar or heavy tread comes back to embitter the remembrance of the sorrowful event.

**Fresh News of Dr. Livingstone.**  
Sir Roderick Murchison has sent the following letter to the London Times:  
I heartily rejoice to announce to the public that I have this morning (the 24th) received a letter from Dr. Kirk, at Zanzibar, dated the 8th of December, 1870, which has relieved me from all anxiety respecting the fate of my illustrious friend Livingstone. Dr. Kirk has just received a letter from the great Arab Sheik Said of Unyamweye, dated 15 Rabea el Akbar, which, being translated, is to this effect: "After compliments, your honored letter has reached, and your friend has understood it. The people (that is) of a caravan sent from Zanzibar arrived in good health, and are going on to Ujiji on their way, the Doctor. The news of him is that he has not yet returned from Manima (the Arabic word is spelt in three different ways), but we expect him soon, and probably he and the people with supplies will reach Ujiji at the same time. Dr. Kirk adds: "At all events, on his arrival at Ujiji from his western journey he will have goods for his present wants." The new gang of men with fresh goods has set out, and the roads being free, we may hope they will reach quickly and safely." We now learn for the first time that Dr. Livingstone has made an extensive journey to the west of Lake Tanganyika, and this accounts for the long-continued absence of all information respecting him. Any letters that Livingstone may have written and confided to jealous Arabs have probably either been destroyed by them, or lost with some of the caravans that perished on the journey to the coast during the cholera epidemic.
