## LARGE SALE OF CORN.

Mr. Kowalski Consumes the Sale Yesterday of 250,000 Bushels of American Corn.

The biggest single sale of American corn probably ever made in Mexico, was made yesterday morning by I. B. Kowalski, Gante street, No. 12. He is the representative of some Mobile houses, and is the prince of corn rustlers in this country. He has contracted for the October, delivery of over one million bushels of American corn, but, his sale yesterday morning, made to one party and under one bill, was 250,000 bushels. It is said that there was no single sale even during 1892-'93, the banner years that involved such a large amount.

The corn above referred to came from Mobile, Ala., making the trip to Veracruz in four days, and thence to this city. It is United States sack corn and is intended for human consumption, for the making of bread and tortillas. The Herald man innocently asked Mr. Kowalski what the price of the corn was laid down at Vera Cruz, but as that was a trade secret, the curiosity of the newspaper man was not gratified. There were other points about the shipment which could not be disclosed, but the Herald man was authorized to make the above statements.

He was further asked to state that there seems to be unnecessary delays on the handling of corn at Veracruz, due to freight congestion and the immense amount of grain waiting to be shipped over the railroad. Furthermore Mr. Kowalski explained that while there is less delay at Tampico in the handling of corn, than at Veracruz, grain men do not get as good freight rates and cannot afford therefore, to import via Tampico. He said that there is also unusual delay at Veracruz as all cargoes have to be lightered, and the delays at the custom house also interfere with the prompt dispatch of grain business at Veracruz.

According to the federal decree recently published in the "Diario Oficial," the diminution of customs duties from one dollar to seventy cents per one hundred kilograms, has been extended for the months of October and November. Mr. Kowalski also stated that the understood that the government was about to extend, or had already extended duty free import privilege to American corn imported into the states of San Luis Potosi, Guanajuato, Aguascalientes, Veracruz, Zacatecas and Puebla, and possibly later on into the state of Tamaulipas, when the corn was imported for distribution among the poor through the charity boards of those states. was increasing very fast and it would soon tax the carrying capacity of the Gulf steamers and the railroads as well as the supplying capacity of the grain elevators in the southern portion of the United States to meet the demand. Evidently Mr. Kowalski intends to keep in the lead or corn importers into Mexico, for the spoke of big combinations in contemplation by the companies he represents, but concerning which he could say no more at present for publication. The duty free importation of American corn into the state of Veracruz especially, will be a godsend to that part of the country where the Indians are suffering from the scarcity of the crop, and concerning whose distressing condition the Herald some time since published the facts.

## THE BANK CLOSED.

And a Few Moments Later Its Treasurer Was a Corpse.

Gloucester, Mass., Oct. 8—At noon today a notice was posted on the doors of the Cape Ann Savings Banks stating that the institution had been closed. Immediately came the shocking news that George J. Marsh, for more than a quarter of a century the trusted treasurer of the bank, had shot himself at his summer home at Annisquam. By Mr. Marsh's body was found a note stating: "If anyone thinks this is a cowardly act let him try it."

Marsh, who was a bachelor, lived the life of a recluse for many years. It is known that he was very intemperate and during the last few years had lost large sums in speculation. He was treasurer of the Cape Ann Savings Bank, of the Gold Home Corporation, of the Gilbert Hospital Corporation and trustee of the Gilbert Charity Fund, the Gilbert estate and the Hough estate and George H. Rogers estate, the Fuller Davis estate, the estate of Sarah M. Johnson and the Hildreth estate. One of his bondsmen stated today that Marsh's bond to the Gilbert Hospital would probably cover his shortage to the corporation but it is rumored that his peculations from other estates will be more than \$100,000, the Hildreth being the principal sufferer. His accounts with the bank are said to be all right. The deposits amount to \$3,300,217. The directors state if there is a run on the bank they will take advantage of the six days clause.

## IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

Temple Houston Fatally Shoots a Man for Spitting — In His Son's Face.

Woodward, O. T., Oct. 8—Temple Houston, a prominent politician, who was a delegate to the Chicago convention, today shot and fatally wounded H. B. Jenkins. The trouble arose over the action of Jenkins in spitting in the face of Houston's son, a few days ago. Houston is under arrest. One year ago today Houston shot and killed J. B. Jennings in a saloon fight in this city. Houston escaped punishment on a plea of self defense.

## THE ECUADOR FIRE.

The Loss at Guayquil is Estimated at \$54,400,550. Origin Incendiary.

Lima, Peru, Oct. 8—The great fire at Grayquil, Ecuador is believed to have been of incendiary origin. Some arrests have been made. Many people lost their lives during the conflagration. The loss is now estimated at \$54,400,550. The populace is furious and is demanding the prompt punishment of the guilty.
