GOVERNOR'S HOGG'S

Thanksgiving Proclamation Has Been Issued.

Abilene, Tex., Nov. 16.—Governor Hogg issued the following this morning in accordance with the custom: "In grateful acknowledgement of the blessing vouchsafed us by the Almighty God, Creator of the universe, I, J. S. Hogg, governor of the State of Texas, do hereby appoint Thursday, the 29th day of November, 1894, as a day of general Thanksgiving, and ask the people of Texas to abstain from all labor other than that of necessity on that day, and that all join in returning thanks to our All Wise Creator for the manifold blessings we have received, and enjoyed as a free, happy and prosperous people."

CLEVELAND'S OFFER IGNORED.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 13.—The prospects for the United States mediation between China and Japan looks less bright today. Six days have passed since Secretary Gresham's obliged Minister Dogn at Tokyo offering the good offices of President Cleveland as mediator in case Japan joined China in requesting it, and as yet Japan has not accepted. This leads to the conclusion that the Japanese government looks with suspicion at the Chinese motives in inaugurating the negotiations.

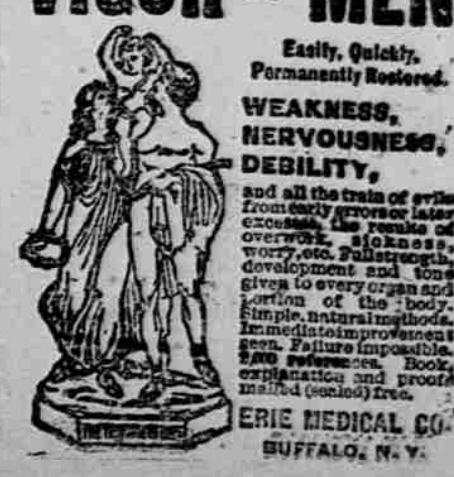
