DALLAS. Lucie Instead of Labor Preferred to Pay a Fine—Stolen Hats Found.

The Fight Against Whiskey—The Car Robbers Indicted—Local Politics.

Dallas, March 19.—Dr. Donald McKay the radical leader who went to the county convict farm Saturday night rather than pay his fine, when he saw what the life of a convict was changed his mind and concluded to settle the claim against him with lucre instead of labor and is now enjoying his liberty.

The police to-day found eighteen fine felt Stetson hats under a cotton company platform where they had been stored by the band of freight car robbers who have done a thriving business the past season, but are now mostly engaged in a season of meditation at the county jail.

The anti-Whiskey wing of the Republicans have enlarged the territory of their operations, and are now circulating petitions in Sherman and other towns for Whiskey's removal as postmaster of Dallas. Fort Worth will be appealed to. But Whiskey is pretty safely anchored.

The grand jury have found bills of indictment against the four Hampton brothers for freight-car robberies; also against Willis Connelly and John Nichols for theft.

The bucket-shop of this city has ceased to do business because it can no longer get the market quotations. The room in which the bucket-shop business was carried on, corner Elm and Austin streets, has been secured by the Merchants' Exchange, which has heretofore operated in the Board of Trade rooms. The members of the exchange had a meeting and agreed to take full market quotations, beginning to-day, and their reports are as full and reliable as any received in the South. The new quarters are more roomy and handy, being on the ground floor.

Galveston, March 19.—The community was profoundly shocked when the death of L. C. Michael of the firm of Greenlee, Black & Company was announced as having occurred at 12:25 to-day. Mr. Michael was born December 27, 1852, at Fitcher near Berlin Prussia and received his education in the latter city. He came to Texas at early age and in the year 1874 entered the commercial house of Greenlee, Black & Company.
