A Waco Lady Ripe in Years Passes Away.

Mrs. E. V. Goode, mother of Hon. R. J. Goode died this morning at 1 o'clock. Mrs. Goode came to Waco with her husband in 1851 and has lived here ever since that time. Her husband died many years ago but the mother has had the care and comfort of a dutiful son. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 10 a. m., at the residence North Second street, Dr. H. A. Bourland officiating. Mrs. Goode had reached the age of 70 years and leaves three sons and two daughters to mourn her.

Mr. W. T. Clarkson, who has for several months past, been a resident of this city, has just returned from a visit to San Antonio. Mr. Clarkson is especially devoted to Waco, being particularly interested in our superior artesian water, a sample of which he sent his father in England. Upon his return to this city, he received a letter stating that Waco water was found, upon thorough analysis, to be especially good for the brewing of ale and porter, and states that he will be in Waco in April, next with a view of establishing a brewery.

ONE MORE TRAIN.

THE MISSION ROUTE SENDS ANOTHER TRAIN TO WACO.

Mr. Stolze did not come back—the strikers claim that the Public are Afraid of the Engineers and will Not Travel on the Trains.

The strike has no new phases today. There was a train in this morning and returned at 5 o'clock to Yoakum. The engineer who was arrested here night before last was not on the engine. The report was current yesterday afternoon that the train would be in at 11 o'clock but it did not arrive at that hour. The police were notified that their services would probably be needed at the depot of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass upon the arrival of the train, and Deputy Marshal Clay, accompanied by several officers, went down at 11 o'clock and remained until 12 when, the train not coming in, they returned to their beats. There was no indication of a disturbance that the officers could see, and when the train did come in it was not molested by anybody. The news from Yoakum indicate a victory there for the strikers, in that the men, or quite a number of them, at least, who had entered into the employ of the railroad company have thrown up their jobs and joined the strikers. The strikers here, claim that the crews the road has inexperienced men, and that the traveling public know this, and will not risk their lives traveling on the trains. It is asserted that only one passenger came up on the train this morning, and he reported that a large number of passengers were at the depots all along the line, anxious to take passage, but were afraid of the engineer. The company claims that reliable men only, are employed, and that they are running regular passenger trains out of San Antonio and in a few days will start the freights out with full crews. They say the only question is their ability to get men and they do not anticipate any trouble with connecting lines in moving their freight. No attempt has been made to move freight trains from Waco.

THE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Sir Charles Tupper said that the McKinley law would result in Canada seeking a market for her products in England.

The house of representatives will investigate the Chicago World's fair management in all its details before voting the \$5,000,000 asked for.

Ignatius Donnelly "roasted" the St. Paul Pioneer Press in the Minnesota Alliance convention, and was elected president of the organization.

Bulgaria's refusal to grant France's demands in relation to the expulsion of M. Chadoine will not result seriously, according to the general belief in Paris.

President Harrison recommended that congress provide a suitable vessel to carry American flour to Russia. The senate passed the resolution and it went to the house.

Governor Bulkeley's demurrer to the quo warranto suit of Morris, Democratic candidate for governor of Connecticut, was sustained by the state supreme court.

Skin Grafting a Success.

LA PORTE, Ind., Jan. 8.—The experiment of treating, by skin grafting, Ernest Schmidt of this city, who was burned with gasoline last summer, and whose burns refused to heal, is a marked success. The skin was furnished by Miss Lina Johnson, the patient and his two brothers. The operation was performed the latter part of December, eight grafts, ranging from one to three inches in length and one-half in width, being made. The grafts have so spread that combined they cover nearly if not quite the entire surface of the wound.

Had not the operation been performed the boy would have been a helpless cripple, but now the usefulness of his limbs has been entirely restored. This is the case wherein the ladies of the LaPorte Charity circle had offered to contribute from their persons the epidermis necessary for the operation, but afterwards declined to have anything to do with the matter because of the widespread notoriety they received from the publication of the intended operation which was to have been kept a profound secret.

A Serpent's Skeleton.

LITTLE ROCK, Jan. 7.—Governor Eagle received the following letter from a citizen living in southwestern Arkansas: "I write to inform you of a skeleton found near Saratoga. It is supposed to be some kind of a serpent's bones. Some of the joints weigh nine and ten pounds each. I have thirty-nine of these joints and a number of pieces of ribs, but no whole ones, but from the best we could tell the ribs would have measured four feet in length. I have been informed that you are gathering the curiosities of our state for the museum, and every one that has seen the bones say that they are one of the greatest curiosities ever seen in this part of our state. The thirty-nine joints weigh 350 pounds. Will you inform me where I can dispose of the bones? Please give me the necessary information in regard to getting the bones to the museum. By so doing you will greatly oblige me."

A Stick Piece of Work.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 8.—A most peculiar case of theft and forgery was accomplished by some shrewd villains. Checks payable to Dr. C. D. Cranch of Mount Auburn, aggregating \$40,000, were abstracted from the office desk during the doctor's absence on a professional case between 11 and 1 o'clock, and the thief deposited them in the Merchants' National bank in the name of C. D. Cranch, saying that he wished to open an account there. Then the thief drew a sum which the bank declined to name, but something less than the sum deposited. He has not yet been found.

Against Hop Tea and Pale Malt Beer.

ATOKA, I. T., Jan. 8.—Governor Jones of the Choctaw nation issued general instructions Tuesday to his sheriffs to report immediately all dealers in hop tea and pale malt beer. This is the first intimation that the Indian government will take a hand in the suppression of the traffic and is a surprise to dealers. The penalty is expulsion from the nation.

A "Short" Lawyer.

NASHVILLE, Jan. 8.—J. H. Meek, a prominent lawyer of Dandridge, is missing and is suspected of being \$25,000 short in his accounts.

He was chancery clerk of the court of that county and managed the school fund of \$50,000. It is thought he has gone to South America.

Sent to the Coal Mines.

ATLANTA, Jan. 8.—DeLaughter, Turner and Perkins, the three robbers who undertook to rifle the Southern express on the Central railroad and were convicted in Chatham county, have been ordered to the Dade county coal mines and they will begin a long service at once.

Death of the Khedive.

CAIRO, Jan. 8.—The khedive is dead. He had been suffering from influenza which developed into congestion of the lungs. This was complicated with a cardiac affection and this afternoon he succumbed.
