**The Birch Discarded.**  
WICHITA, Kas., Jan. 9.—In the Peterson school district in this county is a teacher named Henry McCain, who thinks his power limitless and whose arbitrary rule has led to a bitter neighborhood fight. McCain recently laid down rules governing his pupils during play hours. Among them was one forbidding them to leave the school grounds. A dozen or more of the pupils are young men of 17 to 20, and these objected to such restraint. Wednesday afternoon John Fawbush, one of the big boys, was ordered up to the teacher's desk to receive a whipping for disobeying this order, and when he refused to submit a pistol was pointed at his head. The boy quietly walked up to the teacher and took his gun from him, and then knocked McCain down and hit him with his own birch. The directors who appointed McCain were called together and J. T. Worthington, the chairman, announced that the teacher had authority to shoot a pupil, and declared that had he been in McCain's place he would have killed the scholar. The boy was then dismissed, and as the people of the section have taken sides in the fight there is yet expected to be trouble.

**First and Second Choice.**  
BALTIMORE, Jan. 9.—A corps of reporters from the Baltimore American polled the Maryland legislature Wednesday as to their preferences for president. Of ninety-one members in the house of delegates, eighty-five are Democrats. Forty-five favored Senator Gorman, thirty-five Cleveland and four Governor Hill. One was ill. In the senate thirteen Democrats pronounced for Gorman, seven for Cleveland. Hill is the second choice of nearly all the Democrats. There are only six Republicans in the house and four in the senate, five of these favor Harrison and five are for Blaine.
