Mr. Deihl.

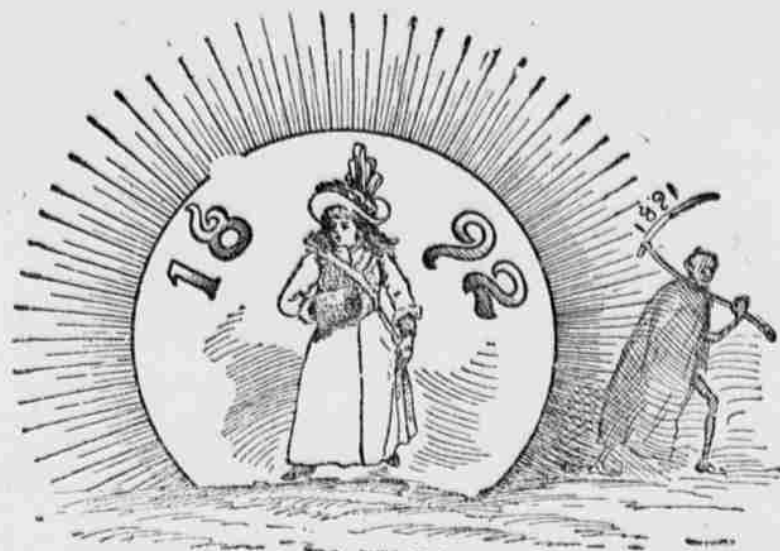
Shot His Half-Brother.

GAINESVILLE, Tex., Jan. 12.—News
reached here Saturday that John Wash-
ington shot and instantly killed his half-
brother, Jim Washington, Friday after-
noon in Delaware Bend, this county.
The trouble originated over the parti-
tion of some land. Jim had but recently
attained his majority, and a few days
ago was married to the daughter of
Judge Jobe Love of the Indian Territory.
Prior to this John had occupied the
land, a part of which Jim claimed.
Since his marriage Jim had begun the
erection of a house on what he thought
to be his land, and this was the occasion
of many angry words between them.
Tuesday all parties were in this city and
took Jake Brazleton the county surveyor,
out to run the dividing line. It was
while doing this that the killing oc-
curred. It seems that there was no im-
mediate provocation for the killing. Jim
Washington was walking along with a
stone on his shoulder when John shot
him, the ball striking above the right
hip and lodging in the abdomen. John
Washington then turned on Brazleton,
the surveyor, who ran and escaped in
the woods.

There was great excitement in this
city when the news reached here, and as
no one had seen Brazleton since the
shooting it was reported that he had been
killed in the woods. A party was being
organized to search for him, when news
came Saturday night that he was at
Dexter unhurt. Washington fled dur-
ing the night, but officers are in pursuit.
All parties are well known in this sec-
tion of Texas and throughout the Indian
Territory. The Washington family is
one of the oldest, most respected and
wealthiest in northern Texas.
