Cotton Acreage.

MEMPHIS, Jan. 12.—Saturday morning in the parlor of the Peabody hotel was held a conference between the commissioners of agriculture of the various southern states who attended the convention of cotton growers on the previous day, regarding the action of the convention, and they agreed on the following memorial:

The commissioners of agriculture representing the states of Alabama, Arkansas, North Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee being impressed with the necessity for a reduction in the acreage of cotton and the greater diversification of crops for home consumption, hereby indorse the action of the cotton growers' and merchants' convention held in the city of Memphis, Jan. 8, 1892, and earnestly appeal to all agricultural and mercantile organizations, consisting of Alliances, Granges, state and county agricultural societies, boards of trade, cotton exchanges, chambers of commerce, etc., and also individual farmers and merchants, to assist and co-operate with us in securing the foregoing results, and to this end recommend the general and local adoption of the action of the convention pledging themselves to a reduction of not less than 20 per cent. of the cotton acreage of last year, and we further urge and recommend the immediate organization of state, county and districts or townships to act either independently or through already organized societies, as deemed best, and to most readily insure the benefits arising from concert of action and the decreased production of cotton for 1892.

Attempt at Lynching.

ST. MARYS, Kan., Jan. 12.—An attempt was made Friday night by a mob of thirty masked men to lynch Lem Goudsberry, the slayer of Peter Binder, confined in the Marshall county jail, this place. The sheriff was called to the door of the jail and overpowered. His keys and revolver were found in his bedroom. The mob had entered the corridor when someone's revolver exploded, and the mob, which lacked organization and leadership, scattered, followed by a fusillade from the jail. No one was injured by the flying bullets, but the mob was badly frightened and dispersed in a panic.
