### Strike Settled.

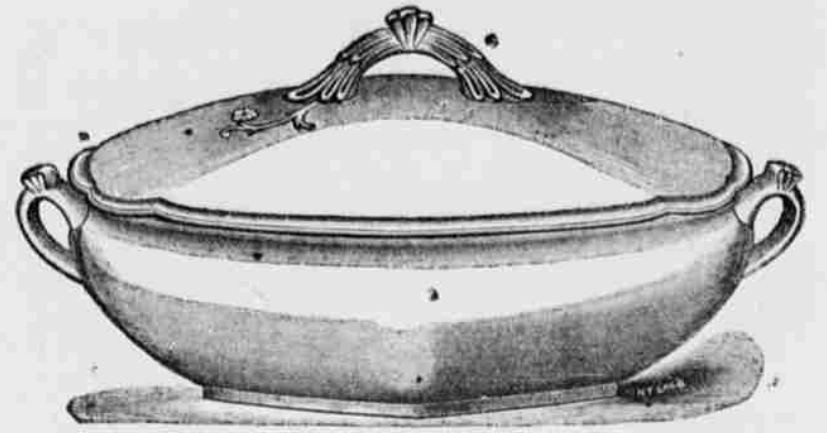
