A CROOKED CONSUL.

CHILEANS ACCUSE MR. MCCREARY WITH USING HIS OFFICE

For Personal Profit—Lieutenant Harlow, World's Fair Commissioner, a Party to the Transactions—Horrible Crimes in Magdeburg, Germany.

New York, Feb. 24.—The Herald's Valparaiso special says: A scandal has cropped out here. It implicates United States Consul McCreary. The story is the sensation of the hour. Documents in the case have just been made public. They relate to alleged transactions in exchange by McCreary. The revelations have fairly astonished mercantile circles. It is asserted the bills show there was bought and sold here in December, 1890, and in January and February, 1891, over \$1,000,000. For the last three months, it is further alleged, he has extensively engaged in exchange transactions. This was especially the case during the time of the Baltimore affair.

It is also alleged he used information which he gained from official sources in his dealings.

This data which has so astonished and wrought up the whole community leaked out through a letter which was sent to Broker Nicklemann by Mr. McCreary and in which the consul threatened legal proceedings unless he was paid a certain sum of money which he claimed was due him. Nicklemann avers on his part that McCreary owes him money.

It is rumored that Lieutenant Harlow, World's fair commissioner, is seriously mixed up in this scandal and that he entered into a sort of partnership with McCreary in his late purchases of bills. The complicity of Mr. McCreary and Lieutenant Harlow is hard to give in detail, as all the documents in the affair, photographs of McCreary's letters, signatures and contracts for exchange are now en route by mail to New York. News of these transactions has helped to increase the feeling in this city against the consul, who has not for quite awhile been favorably regarded here. Lieutenant Harlow's letters to certain New York newspapers, in view of present circumstances, seem to Chilean minds to furnish grounds for the startling rumors in the United States, viz.: For the purpose of materially profiting those engaged in this affair. I am given to understand that prominent Chileans of Valparaiso are considering the advisability of asking their government to return Consul McCreary's exequator.

Crimes at Magdeburg.

Berlin, Feb. 24.—The police of Magdeburg, a large town seven miles from the city, are instituting inquiries into a series of murders of servant girls, information of which they only recently obtained. The crimes were of the most bloody character and give evidence of the brutal and depraved nature of the persons who are accused of having planned and carried them into execution. These murders resemble in most of their horrible details the startling list of murders which not long ago were unearthed in Vienna, in which Fritz Schneider and wife by means of decoy advertisements calling for servants lured a large number of girls to their residence where, upon the first favorable opportunity, Schneider, assisted in the revolting work by his wife, would treat the unfortunate girls in a most outrageous manner and then strangle the poor victims to death afterwards, taking possession of all their belongings.

The prisoners charged with the murders at Magdeburg are a man named Fritz Erbee and fiancée, Dorothy Buntrock, and since their arrest enough evidence has been collected by the police to implicate them in the mysterious disappearance of servant girls, who while seeking employment were suddenly lost sight of by relatives and friends.

Again, as in the Vienna case, the suspicions of the authorities was aroused by the disappearance of a certain one of the victims, and investigation revealed a series of foul crimes. Erbee and the woman Buntrock were arrested on suspicion of having murdered a servant named Karen. The couple it is now known also decoyed and murdered another girl named Dora Klases. The authorities are still prosecuting the investigation into the matter. Dorothy Buntrock has broken down and made a confession to the police.

Sensational Preaching.

AUGUSTA, Ga., Feb. 24.—At St. John's Methodist Episcopal church an incident occurred. This is the church of which Rev. W. W. Wadsworth is pastor. For a year past Mr. Wadsworth has been delivering sensational sermons denouncing the social customs of the city. He took for his text "Christ as a sensational preacher," in which he proceeded to criticize an editorial on christian charity which recently appeared in the Chronicle. The author of that editorial was known to be Mr. C. J. Beane, a member of Mr. Wadsworth's church, and who was present. The preacher held up to ridicule the personal peculiarities of the editor, dubbing him an embryo poet, etc. As soon as the sermon was concluded Mr. Bayne arose and announced that he would answer the preacher. Great applause followed the announce-

ment, when the preacher again sneeringly replied by hoping "the kid would do better than he had done heretofore." Here the applause became uproarious and Wadsworth recalled their attention to the fact that they were in the house of God. Then the congregation dispersed in great confusion.

Favorable Report Ordered.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The house judiciary committee authorized Mr. Oates of Alabama to report favorably his bill to repeal the provision of the revised statutes making loyalty during the late war a pre-requisite to securing a pension on the part of persons otherwise entitled to be pensioned. No back pay, however, will be received by persons affected by this act.

His Favorite Daughter.

MEMPHIS, Feb. 23.—Near Clarksville, Ark., J. W. Thompson, a wealthy and highly respected farmer, attempted suicide by etching his throat, and at last accounts was in a critical condition. The cause of his act was despondency resulting from the disgrace brought upon his name by his favorite daughter, Georgia, who has been for six months past leading a life of shame in this city. She is not more than 20 years old, well educated and the most beautiful woman of her class that has appeared in Memphis for years. Her downfall dates from last spring when, as she claims, she was led astray by a business man of this city, who met her while on her way home from a visit to friends in the interior of the state. She became his mistress and his wife had them both arrested for illegal cohabitation. The affair was published in the Memphis papers, and Mr. Thompson found out for the first time what had become of his daughter. The thought of her conduct threw him into a state of melancholy, which finally resulted as stated. The girl will go home in the hope of obtaining his forgiveness before he dies.

All for a Third Party.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 24.—The Reform Press association held an open session at which there was a much more numerous attendance. Most of the session was consumed in discussing and denouncing the National Union company as being connected with or backed by the cordage trust. A committee of five was appointed to investigate the whole subject and report at the afternoon session. The rest of the time was taken up with addresses by Colonel L. L. Polk, General Weaver, A. J. Streeter of Illinois and Ignatius Donnelly. All took ground in favor of a third party.

Slightly Mixed.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Feb. 23.—Sixty-five-year-old George Smiley of Harrisburg has just married 37-year-old Miss Annie Carman of Southeastern Missouri in this city. The bride is the youngest sister of the wife of T. M. Smiley, son of George Smiley, and by this peculiar union the bride becomes the mother-in-law of her elder sister and the latter the daughter-in-law of her youngest sister. The father and son are brothers-in-law. The five children of T. M. Smiley (the son) are now the grandchildren of their late aunt.

A large vessel, supposed to have been Spanish, was wrecked off Penzance on the Cornish coast. All hands are believed to have been lost.
