FREE BAGGING BILL.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Proposing to Admit Free of Duty Machinery for Manufacturing Cotton Bagging as Well as the Manufactured Article. Supreme Court Decisions.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The following is the report of Mr. Turner of Georgia, from the ways and means committee, in favor of the bill to admit free of duty bagging for cotton, machinery for manufacturing bagging, cotton ties and cotton gins:

The bill proposes an act of tardy justice to those who contribute the chief item of our export trade. The right to resort to imported bagging and ties will, it is confidently believed, protect the farmers and laborers engaged in the production of cotton against corners and combinations among those who under the present tariff control the supply of these indispensable articles. The importation of machinery used in the manufacture of bagging is proposed in this bill for the benefit of American bagging factories. They already have their raw material free. An additional reason is suggested by the fact that if these very simple machines can be imported free, the farmers themselves can join in production of bagging. They will thus have in their own hands a final defense against trusts and monopolies. They are still smarting from the oppression which the very recent combination imposed, raising the price of bagging nearly 100 per cent. The effect of the McKinley rates upon bagging and ties has not yet been fully developed. The first effect has been to cut off importation of these articles. The next step will be an augmentation of price.

Dalzell of Pennsylvania is preparing the report of the Republican minority in opposition to the bill.

No Quorum Was All Right.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The "no quorum" case, in which the legality of the Dingley worsted act was attacked by Ballin, Joseph & Co., importers, was decided by the United States supreme court. The Dingley act was passed through the action of Speaker Reed in counting a quorum of members present, but not voting. The importers maintained that Speaker Reed's action was in violation of the constitution and an act passed in this manner was void. The United States circuit court for the southern district of New York decided against the United States and in favor of the importers on this ground, so that the case came before the United States supreme court adverse to the constitutionality of the "no quorum" method of parliamentary procedure. The court, in a decision by Justice Brewer, held that "no quorum" rule was valid and that the house of representatives had the right to make such a rule.

The suggestion there might be a deliberate conspiracy between the presiding officers and the president to make a law not passed by congress the court said could not hold. The enrolled act of the court held was conclusive.

Three Times Constitutional.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Three cases in which the importers sought to contest the constitutionality of the McKinley tariff act were decided by the United States supreme court. The titles to these are: Boyd, Sutton & Co. and Herman Sternbach & Co., each void as to the United States, and Joel B. Erhardt, collector of the port of New York, and Marshall Field & Co. vs. Clark, collector of the port of Chicago. The ground on which it was maintained the tariff was unconstitutional was the tobacco rebate section of the bill had been omitted in its enrollment after its passage by congress and therefore the bill signed by the president was not the bill passed by the legislative department of the government; that the reciprocity feature was a transmission to the executive of law making power and therefore void, vitiating the whole act, and lastly that the act was void because of the sugar bounty provision. The court affirmed the judgments of the New York and Illinois courts of the United States in favor of the constitutionality of the act.

About Gold Reserves.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—At the instance of Representative Dockery of Missouri the house adopted a resolution directing the committee on judiciary to inquire and report to the house as to the right of the secretary of the treasury to use the \$100,000,000 gold reserve for current expenditures. In regard to the resolution, Dockery said: I asked the house to accept the resolution for the reason that there seems to be some doubt upon the question, especially emphasized by an interview of the secretary himself, published in this city, in which he is quoted as saying: "As to the \$100,000,000 gold reserve, it is held against \$350,000,000 national bank notes, to make the credit of the government impregnable, for no one will be able to get together enough greenbacks to take all of the gold out of the treasury and therefore they do not take any. But these notes outstanding are legal tender and the government can as well use the gold reserves if it needs to in a pinch. It should therefore appear in the debt statement as available cash."

SEDALIA, Mo., Feb. 29.—The Taylor affair was made the subject of the sermons of two city churches last night. Both ministers took ground in opposition to a wide open town such as Sedalia has been for some time past, warning the people what such a state of affairs would lead to. All information which might tend towards the capture of the negro ravisher is promptly reported to head quarters at the Council Chamber. The public feeling is moderating, though if the criminal be captured now, lynching will be inevitable. Dick Beatly, a suspect, was arrested at Utterville by members of the Vigilance Committee yesterday and brought to this city. He was not, however, identified by Mr. Taylor. Frank Collins, another negro, has been arrested in Kansas City on suspicion, but many believe the man under arrest at Van Buren, Ark., is the one wanted.
